SUBJECT: NOVEMBER 3, 2020 ELECTION - NEW MANDATES

Pursuant to **Executive Order N-64-20** signed by the Governor of California, every registered voter in the state of California will receive a vote-by-mail ballot.

Executive Order N-67-20 signed by the Governor of California mandates the following:

- Vote-By-Mail (VBM) Tracking System all county elections officials are required to use the Secretary of State's VBM tracking system "BallotTRAX" – registered voters can sign up to receive automatic emails, text messages, or voice call notifications when their ballots are mailed, received, and counted.
- At least one (1) VBM drop-off location is available for every 15,000 registered voters:
 - ✓ From October 5, 2020 through November 3, 2020 (election day) during regular business hours; and
 - ✓ At least one VBM drop-off location is available for 12 hours each day.
- At least one (1) polling place is available for every 10,000 registered voters:
 - ✓ From October 31, 2020 (Saturday) through November 2, 2020 (Monday) from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.; and
 - ✓ November 3, 2020 (Tuesday) from 7:00 a.m. until 8:00 p.m.

Assembly Bill No. 860 (Berman), approved by the Governor of California on June 18, 2020 as urgency legislation, additionally imposes the same mandates as mentioned above in the two Executive Orders that require county elections officials to mail a VBM ballot to every registered voter and to use the Secretary of State's ballot tracking system, and also requires the following:

• Extends the deadline by which VBM ballots must be received by the county elections officials to the 17th day after election day; and

 Requires county elections officials to permit any voter to cast a ballot using a certified remote accessible VBM system.

Senate Bill No. 423 (Umberg), approved by the Governor of California on August 6, 2020 as urgency legislation, was a companion bill to support in person voting opportunities provided for in Executive Order N-67-20.

What this means for La Quinta and Riverside County?

• Vote-By-Mail Drop-Off Locations – City Hall and La Quinta Wellness Center have been designated as VBM drop-off locations (Attachment 1) and will be operational as listed above.

Registrar of Voters (ROV) has established a total of 79 VBM drop-off locations in Riverside County (Attachment 2).

• Vote Centers – City Hall, the La Quinta Wellness Center, and La Quinta Museum have been designated as in-person vote centers and will be operational as listed above (Attachment 3).

ROV has established a total of 130 Vote Centers in Riverside County (Attachment 4); each site will be staffed with at least 10 County appointed staff members and will have six (6) ballot marking devices (tablets); ROV will provide personal protective equipment, sanitation supplies, and will enforce social distancing.

Voters do not have to go to a designated vote center. Vote centers differ from traditional polling places in that they are connected to the Secretary of State's voter registration database and a voter can pull his/her ballot from any vote center location.

Conditional voter registration will be available at each vote centers, for eligible voters who missed the voter registration deadline (15-days prior to election day), and will be provided a provisional ballot.

- Vote-By-Mail Ballots ROV will mail an estimated 1.2 million ballots starting on October 5, 2020; and will extend the "received" deadline to 17 days after the election for ballots postmarked on or prior to election day.
 - Voters can mail in their ballot via United States Postal Service using the postage paid return envelope included with their ballot or drop it off at a designated VBM drop-off location.
- Track Your Ballot (Attachment 6) ROV is using the Secretary of State's BallotTRAX tracking system; voters can sign up using the link below to receive automatic emails, text messages, or voice call notifications when their ballots are mailed, received, and counted.

- Vote-By-Mail Remote Accessible System ROV will publish remote accessibility for VBM ballots on its website effective October 5, 2020 this is an online ballot marking tool, it does not record votes; this system allows voters to pull up their VMB ballot through the ROV's website by entering their name, resident address, and date of birth. The system will pull up their individual ballot, allow the voter to make his/her selections, print it out, and mail it back to the ROV.
- Voter Information Guide ROV will mail the guides approximately 40 days before election day; and the guides will contain a list of all vote centers and VBM drop-off locations, a sample ballot, candidate statements, and measure materials.

- **Election Results** first election results will be issued shortly after 8:00 p.m. on election night, November 3, 2020.
- **Register to Vote** citizens can register to vote or check their registration status electronically through the Secretary of State's website at www.registertovote.ca.gov (Attachment 7).

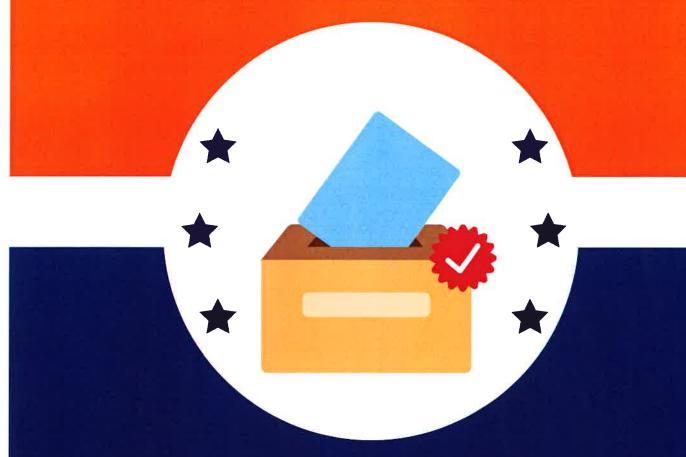

MAYOR EVANS RECONVENED THE OPEN SESSION PORTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL MEETING AT 4:02 P.M. WITH ALL MEMBERS PRESENT

REPORT ON ACTION(S) TAKEN IN CLOSED SESSION:

City Attorney Ihrke reported the following pursuant to Government Code section 54950 *et seq.* (Brown Act):

involves the settlement of claims submitted by Granite against the City pursuant to a duly awarded, publicly bid contract.

The substance of the settlement agreement may be summarized as follows:

- ✓ The settlement agreement resolves all pending and potential claims involving work completed on City-owned property (approximately 10 acres) near the corner of Eisenhower Drive and Avenida Fernando;
- ✓ The contracted work covered Capital Improvement City Project No. 2015-12B for the Eisenhower Drive Drainage Improvements, including construction of a retention basin with buried liner, catch basins and drywells, engineered soil on liner, outlet structures with rip-rap, and storm drains, among other items;
- ✓ Initially the total claim submitted against the City was in excess of \$623,000, but the parties agreed to settle for \$220,000, inclusive and relating to resolving all claims alleged for constructive changes, differing site conditions, and delays in payment; and
- ✓ Full releases and waivers of claims, and no admission of fault, along with other "standard" settlement agreement terms are included in the agreement.

<u>MOTION</u>: A motion was made and seconded by Councilmembers Fitzpatrick/Peña to approve the settlement agreement; and authorize the City Manager to execute agreement and take any implementing actions on behalf of the City. Motion passed unanimously.

If and when the settlement agreement is executed, upon inquiry of any person, the terms and conditions of the agreement are subject to disclosure and would be available for inspection as a public record.

City Clerk Radeva said the Clerk's Office did receive, submitted as part of written public comments, copies of private social media postings and conversations that were not made by the person submitting the public comments. After consultation with the City Attorney, it was determined that the private social media postings and conversations were redacted because they are not from a social media platform which the City maintains or commented on as part of official City business, and the person submitting the written public comments did not provide written proof of consent from any of the third parties who made the postings or conversations on the private social media platform.

The following <u>PUBLIC SPEAKERS</u> provided verbal comments via <u>TELEPHONIC</u> ACCESSIBILITY:

- Carrie Breeswine, La Quinta thanked the Council for their service and dedication to the La Quinta community; expressed concerns about the adverse effects of STVR to residential neighborhoods and to the quality of life of full-time residents; and implored that the STVR enforcement and monitoring recommendations prepared by the STVR Program Adhoc Committee (Committee) be implemented.
- Richard De Leonardis, La Quinta expressed concerns about the adverse effects of STVR to residential neighborhoods and to the quality of life of full-time residents; said the homeowners association (HOA) of his community has been unsuccessful in prohibiting or changing the structure of STVR; said the membership of the Committee is not well balanced; and urged that the City take strict actions related to STVR.

The following <u>PUBLIC SPEAKER</u>, listed in the order in which they spoke, provided <u>IN-PERSON</u> verbal comments:

- Christopher Mikulenka, La Quinta expressed concerns about the adverse effects of STVR to residential neighborhoods and to the quality of life of full-time residents, the STVR hotline, number of active STVR licenses, compliance enforcement, enforcement staffing levels, and excessive on-street parking by STVR renters; said non-compliant homeowners and property managers must be held accountable, and additional staff resources should be dedicated to the STVR program.
- Kathy Hartung, La Quinta said she has been a La Quinta resident for 34 years; expressed concerns about the adverse effects of STVR to residential neighborhoods and to the quality of life of full-time residents due to noise, over concentration of STVR in the same area, over occupancy, excessive on-street parking and partying by STVR renters; said there are STVR properties that are well managed and compliant; the Committee's membership should be balanced; thanked the Council and City staff for their efforts to bring the STVR program into compliance; and asked that the dignity and calmness of La Quinta be restored.
- Elizabeth Uher, La Quinta said she has been a La Quinta resident since 1979; expressed concerns about the adverse effects of STVR to residential neighborhoods and to the quality of life of full-time residents due to noise, over concentration of STVR in the same area, over occupancy, excessive trash, on-street parking and partying by STVR renters; noted that STVR have been around for a while without any problems, and the current issues are a recent development; and urged that the City take measures to restore the peace and quiet of the community. Ms. Uher submitted photos as a hand-out to show the waste and excessive parking caused by STVRs in her area, which were incorporated into the record and agenda packet.
- David Dinnel, La Quinta said he is speaking on behalf of Vacation Rental Owners and Neighbors of La Quinta (VRON-LQ), a new non-profit organization in La Quinta formed in an effort for STVR owners and neighbors to become part of the solution of the challenges related to STVR in the City; VRON-LQ is modeled after VRON-Palm Springs, which is dedicated to preserving Palm Springs rich history of vacation rentals and home-sharing through education, awareness, and the promotion of responsible vacation rental ownership and management. Mr. Dinnel said VRON-LQ promotes the same mission statement as VRON-PS; the goal is to get a high percentage of La Quinta owners to join the

organization and become a part of the solution; and spoke about VRON-LQ's efforts to promote STVR compliance.

- Anna Duitruk, La Quinta said she is a STVR owner and a member of VRON-LQ; noted VRON-LQ's core values are cooperation, balancing the needs of the community neighbors and owners alike, and co-existing in a harmonious relationship; VRON-LQ's efforts will include proactive education of new and existing STVR owners, possibly one-on-one communications with members of the Council to discuss alternative methods of addressing STVR issues. Ms. Duitruk expressed her empathy and concern for the residents who provided comments depicting their unfortunate experience with STVRs; and spoke of the responsible management and preventative methods she applies in managing her STVRs to ensure compliance and the quality of life for her neighbors.
- Melissa Labayog, La Quinta said the City should not ban STVR permanently, but rather implement measures to ensure non-compliant STVRs can be addressed effectively; consider zoning areas for STVRs; STVR properties within HOAs should be monitored and managed by the HOAs; STVR properties that are not within gated residential communities need the City to impose regulations and fines that will evoke compliance; and spoke about the career of pro-golfer Marlene Bauer Hagge, founder of the Ladies Professional Golf Association Foundation, which supports women and young people through programs and initiatives aimed at empowering them through the game of golf, and handed out flyers, which were incorporated into the record and agenda packet.
- Shane Falleur, La Quinta expressed concerns about the adverse effects
 of STVR to residential neighborhoods and to the quality of life of fulltime residents due to noise, over concentration of STVR in the same
 area, renters disregard to personal property; and encouraged the City
 to take action to restore the quality of life in the community.

Council thanked the residents for their continuous public comments and feedback, and assured them that the concerns being raised are not falling on deaf ears; noted the City is not idly standing by, and has been in the process of actively evaluating the STVR program in order to identify best practices from other communities, the necessary changes and improvements, and set policy that responds to the community's needs; the City's Committee is preparing recommendations for Council's consideration, and the Council will implement policy as soon as feasibly possible; the City has monitored the STVR program closely since its inception in 2008; the STVR program continues to evolve based on the ever-changing environment; and the City is enforcing

compliance, has taken additional steps through Executive Orders to mitigate STVR impacts due to COVID-19, including increased noise restrictions and a 90-day moratorium on new STVR licenses.

Council commended the efforts and professionalism of the City's Code Compliance Division and the Riverside County Sherriff's Department police officers in addressing and enforcing STVR compliance.

Management Analyst Mignogna and Design and Development Director Castro presented an update on completed, in-construction, and in-design City projects citywide.

Council thanked the La Quinta residents for passing Measure G, a 1% sales and use tax, which has allowed the City to not only cover increasing costs for public safety services, but to also augment the City's investments in its infrastructure and capital improvements.

3. INTRODUCE FIRE CHIEF BILL WIESER WITH THE RIVERSIDE COUNTY FIRE DEPARTMENT

La Quinta Fire Chief Fish with the Riverside County Fire Department introduced Fire Chief Bill Wieser who gave a brief presentation of his background and experience.

Council thanked the Fire Department team for their commitment and dedicated service, and congratulated Chief Wieser on his promotion.

4. PROCLAMATION IN RECOGNITION OF NATIONAL DEAF AWARENESS MONTH – SEPTEMBER 2020

Mayor Evans, on behalf of the City Council, presented a proclamation in recognition of September as National Deaf Awareness month, which was accepted by Lisa Schmidt, Teacher for the Deaf and Hard of Hearing at Shadow Hills High School, who is also deaf, and expressed her gratitude for the City's recognition, and said the proclamation will be displayed at the school's deaf and hard hearing room.

1. APPROVE AGREEMENT FOR CONTRACT SERVICES WITH GHD, INC TO PROVIDE HIGHWAY 111 CORRIDOR FORM-BASED CODE PLANNING AND ENGINEERING SERVICES FOR THE HIGHWAY 111 CORRIDOR PROJECT NO. 2019-05

Planning Manager Flores and Management Analyst Mignogna presented the staff report, which is on file in the Clerk's Office.

Council discussed form-based code is used to create spaces where people want to be, a destination and not a pass-through; the goal is to use form-based code to help the City design these spaces along the Highway 111 Corridor (Corridor) to make it a destination; it is holistic approach to zoning as it incorporates and takes into account land use, engineering, street-scape, building form, etc. to create a space where people want to be; if implemented, it will become a City regulation; the anticipated location for the demonstration form-based code project is along Highway 111 between La Quinta Center Drive and La Quinta Drive, pending coordination with the relevant property owners; and the contract is comprised of a total of four (4) phases, with phases (3) and (4) being optional, which will be brought back for Council consideration and direction on whether or not to proceed at a future date.

<u>PUBLIC SPEAKER</u>: Todd Tregenza, AICP, Senior Transportation Planner with GHD, Inc., and the overall Project Manager for this effort – said a pure formbased code does not regulate land use, it allows any use of the land, and instead it designs and regulates the form – it provides a set of guidelines on

the way it must be designed; it does not need to be in a pure form, and a hybrid can be implemented, based on the community's input and desired transformation; and GHD, Inc. has partnered with Lisa Wise Consulting, Inc., a renowned form-based code expert in the industry, for this project.

<u>PUBLIC SPEAKER</u>: Lindsey Van Parys, Project Manager with GHD, Inc. – provided examples in which the City of Las Vegas was able to repurpose and revision its old downtown area, allowing developers to pick the land use, as well as the city to revitalize the area by regulating the form and design of the development instead of the land use. Ms. Van Parys said for La Quinta, the CV Link project is an opportunity for revisioning the Corridor and establishing connectivity with it to draw people to the Corridor and find inviting spaces and uses that will allow the Corridor's transformation; and GHD will prepare a 3-D visualization and fly-through presentation that will provide a clear image and feel of what the revisioning could be.

Council discussed the importance of connectivity between north and south La Quinta, as well as between the cities of Indian Wells, La Quinta, and Indio; identifying better uses for the parking spaces; and making the Corridor a destination instead of a place where folks go to shop and leave.

Council requested that Staff provide examples of smaller cities that have successfully implement pure or a hybrid of form-based codes.

<u>MOTION</u> – A motion was made and seconded by Councilmembers Radi/Sanchez to approve an Agreement for Contract Services with GHD, Inc. in the amount of \$885,228, to provide form-based code planning and engineering services for the Highway 111 Corridor project; and authorize the City Manager to execute the agreement. 5. DESIGN AND DEVELOPMENT – SHORT-TERM VACATION RENTAL PROGRAM AD-HOC COMMITTEE UPDATE

Community Resources Director Escobedo and Code Compliance Supervisor Meredith provided an overview of the City's established code compliance efforts and enforcement as related to STVR; and the City's proactive efforts in launching a 60-day pilot program by contracting additional security services to assist with response and compliance on the weekends and effectively addressing repeated non-compliant STVR, and will provide Council at the end of the program.

Council requested that Staff communicate the City's enforcement process and proactive efforts to the residents who provided verbal comments at the beginning of the meeting.

Council commended the efforts and dedication of the La Quinta Code Compliance team.

Community Resources Director Escobedo, Design and Development Director Castro, and Committee Member Caldwell presented the staff report, which is on file in the Clerk's Office.

Council discussed the different types of STVR complaints; the importance to ensure owners, managers, and renters are educated and respectful of the rules; the efforts of PGA West's HOAs to ensure STVR compliance within the PGA West community, the HOA recently issued rules in line with the City's regulations, and options for the HOA security to collaborate with the City as it relates to STVR enforcement and sharing information on confirmed violations;

density of STVR based on number of STVR on a block as well as based on lot sizes; STVR disruptions of the quiet enjoyment of residential neighborhoods.

<u>PUBLIC SPEAKER VIA TELEPHONIC ACCESSIBILITY</u>: John Hastie, La Quinta – said he owns a STVR, has always been a responsible operator, and has had no complaints; the STVR regulations have become very strict; noted that a ban of STVR is not the solution, and that non-compliant properties should be held accountable; he has joined VRON-LQ and looks forward to working together as a community to find the right solutions.

<u>PUBLIC SPEAKER</u>: David Dinnel, La Quinta – said implementing the ability to fine guests instead of just the owners could be more effective in achieving compliance; and commended City staff for contracting for additional enforcement services in order to be better able to address problem STVR.

Council discussed that STVR owners are able to impose fines on their guests by including terms and conditions to this effect in the rental agreement.

Mayor Evans thanked the Council for their participation tonight, and support of FIND Food Bank (FIND) Hunger Action Month efforts, through local news channel KESQ, to highlight the needs of the community and how folks might be able to help. September is Hunger Action Month, and FIND is raising awareness by sharing resources, showcasing community involvement, and displaying orange, the symbolic color of hunger relief.

Mayor Evans thanked Council and the community for their participation and interest in the virtual 9/11 Memorial Ceremony.

Approve purchase of five Autoscope Vision video detection systems from Econolite Systems Inc. in the amount of \$83,710; and authorize the City Manager to execute the purchase order.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- The Autoscope Vision vehicle video detection systems are needed to replace current systems which have reached end of life at intersections along the Jefferson Street corridor.
- The new vehicle video detection systems are compliant with the upcoming Coachella Valley Association of Governments (CVAG) Valley Wide Signal Synchronization Project.
- Three bids were obtained per the City's purchasing policy and Econolite submitted the lowest bid (Attachment 1).

FISCAL IMPACT

Funds are available in the 2020/21 Capital Improvement Program with the Traffic Maintenance Improvement Project, (Account No. 401-0000-60188, Construction, Project Account 2021TMI) in the amount of \$83,710. A portion of this purchase, a total of \$21,931, will be recovered per the shared intersections maintenance agreement with the City of Indio at 4 locations as follows.

The City of Indio's percentage contribution per intersection will be as follows:

Jefferson and Vista Grande - 6% or \$1,004

Jefferson and Avenue 48 - 50% or \$8,371

Jefferson and Avenue 49 - 50% or \$8,371

Jefferson and Avenue 50 – 25% or \$4,185

Jefferson and Pomelo - 0%

After this interagency reimbursement the City's net investment will be \$61,779.00.

BACKGROUND/ANALYSIS

The current video detection systems along the Jefferson Street corridor are at the end of life and are no longer maintained by the manufacturer. The Autoscope Vision video detection systems will provide more accurate and efficient detection of motorist, cyclist, and vehicular traffic movement counts and a live video feed of vehicle detection back to the Traffic Operations Center at City Hall. This video detection system is also on the approved equipment list for the CVAG Valley Wide Signal Synchronization Project.

ALTERNATIVES

Staff does not recommend an alternative action.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- In October 2016, the City began exploring the creation of a Public Safety Camera System (PSCS) to serve the City's emergency responders and assist City Staff with operations.
- The full PSCS scope proposes to place a total of 93 new cameras at the following locations: (Attachment 1)
 - All Signalized and Major Roundabout Intersections: 59
 - Fritz Burns Park: 4La Quinta Park: 6
 - o City Hall: 13
 - o Wellness Center: 6
 - o Library: 5
- Due to budget considerations the project will be bid with additive alternates. The base bid will include 58 cameras at intersections; 4 cameras at Fritz Burns Park; and 5 cameras at La Quinta Park. The remainder will be bid as additive alternates.

FISCAL IMPACT

This project is allocated in the 2020/21 Capital Improvement Program (CIP) and is budgeted in the Public Safety Fund. The following is the project budget:

The additive alternates are anticipated to cost an additional \$364,000. These will be presented to Council after bids are opened.

BACKGROUND/ANALYSIS

At the January 15, 2019 meeting, the Council directed Staff to proceed with a pilot program of the public safety camera system. At the June 18, 2019 Council meeting Staff presented the findings of the pilot program. On December 3, 2019 Council directed Staff to retain Convergint Technologies to prepare design exhibits and scope specifications.

After reviewing the preferred full scope against the current available budget, Staff identified critical camera locations. These include all intersections that have signals or are major roundabouts; Fritz Burns Park and La Quinta Park. The other locations will be bid but are included as additive alternates that can be awarded as funding in the budget allows.

Contingent upon approval to advertise the project for bid on October 6, 2020, the following is the project schedule:

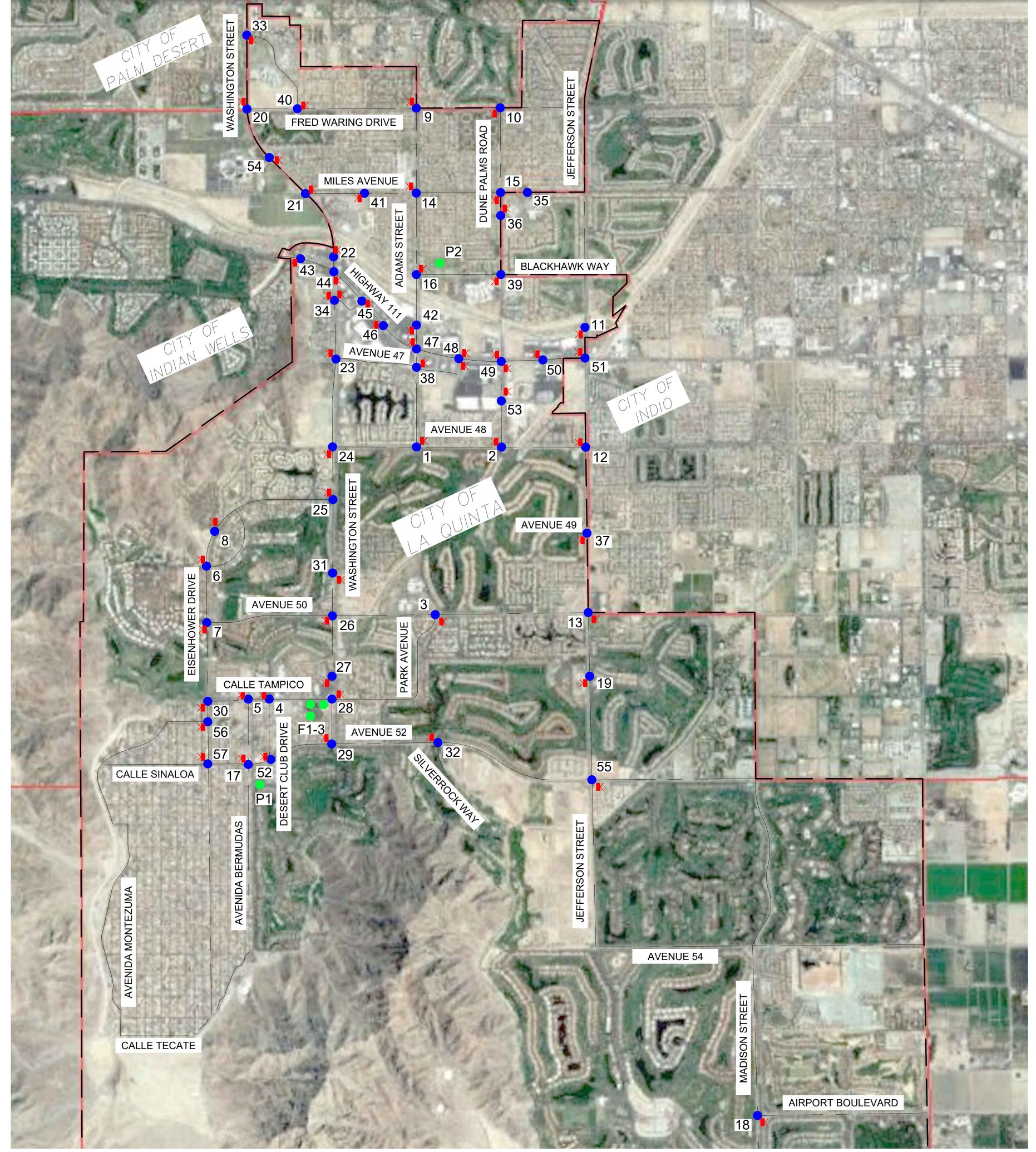

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- The project entailed construction of a retention basin on a 10.4-acre property that holds approximately 57.97 acre-feet of water, six new catch basins on Eisenhower Drive, a new catch basin on Coachella Drive north of Eisenhower Drive, a new storm drainage pipeline to the retention basin, and an overflow connection pipe for the La Quinta Golf Estates entrance drainage system.
- The work is complete and Council acceptance will close the contract and allow final payment.

BACKGROUND/ANALYSIS

On April 16, 2019, Council awarded a \$2,304,423 contract to Granite Construction Company.

On June 4, 2019, a Notice to Proceed was issued with a 90-working day completion time starting on June 10, 2019 and ending on October 15, 2019. Contract Change Order No. 3 extended the contract to October 29, 2019. The project was deemed substantially complete on December 2, 2019. No liquidated damages or early completion incentives are recommended. The final contract amount includes a claim settlement in the amount of \$220,000.

Contract Change Order No. 1 was issued for the upgrade from a standard 301 catch basin to standard 302 for catch basin number 2.

Contract Change Order No. 2 was issued for the upgrade from a standard 301 catch basin to standard 302 for catch basin number 7.

Contract Change Order No. 3 was issued for the installation of 24" high-density polyethylene (HDPE) storm drain pipe, construction of a headwall, and to maintain dust control for additional days.

Contract Change Order No. 4 was issued for time and materials to construct a bulkhead on line 2 and for thicker asphalt concrete (AC) and base.

Contract Change Order No. 5 was issued for time and materials to repair a sinkhole on Eisenhower Drive.

Contract Change Order No. 6 was issued for a rip rap quantity adjustment.

Contract Change Order No. 7 was issued for time and materials for median nose repair.

The project construction effort is complete and in compliance with the plans and specifications. Staff recommends acceptance and release of the retention immediately after the Notice of Completion is recorded, no later than October 15, 2020.

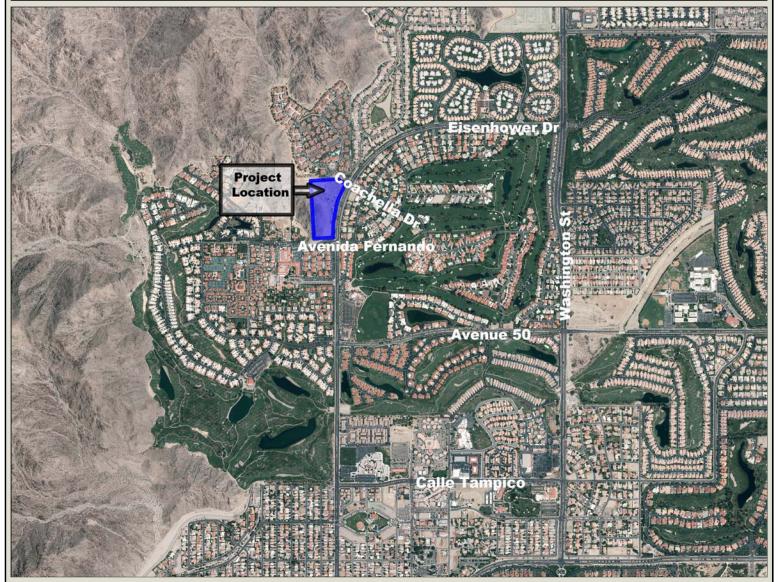

<u>Original Total Budget</u> – represents revenue and expenditure budgets the Council adopted in June 2020 for fiscal year 2020/21.

<u>Current Total Budget</u> – represents original adopted budgets plus any Council approved budget amendments from throughout the year. The 2019/20 operating and Capital Improvement Project carryovers to 2020/21 will be processed after the year-end audit is completed.

<u>Period Activity</u> – represents actual revenues received and expenditures outlaid in the reporting month.

<u>Fiscal Activity</u> – represents actual revenues received and expenditures outlaid YTD.

<u>Variance Favorable/(Unfavorable)</u> - represents the dollar difference between YTD collections/expenditures and the current budgeted amount.

<u>Percent Used</u> – represents the percentage activity as compared to budget YTD.

The revenue report includes revenues and transfers into funds from other funds (income items). Revenues are not received uniformly throughout the year, resulting in peaks and valleys. For example, large property tax payments are usually received in December and May. Similarly, Redevelopment Property Tax Trust Fund payments are typically received in January and June. Any timing imbalance of revenue receipts versus expenditures is funded from the City's cash flow reserve.

(5) Annual subscription fees for Tyler (Finance Dept.), TrakIt (Hub/permits) and Granicus (City website).

The expenditure report includes expenditures and transfers out to other funds. Unlike revenues, expenditures are more likely to be consistent from month to month. However, large debt service payments or CIP expenditures can cause swings.

AGENDA TITLE: ADOPT RESOLUTION TO AUTHORIZE CITY PARTICIPATION IN THE COUNTY OF RIVERSIDE'S URBAN COUNTY PROGRAM FOR FEDERAL FISCAL YEARS 2021, 2022, AND 2023

RECOMMENDATION

Adopt a resolution to authorize City participation in the County of Riverside's Urban County Program for Federal Fiscal Years 2021, 2022, and 2023; approving the Riverside County Cooperation Agreement for Community Development Block Grant Funds, Home Investment Partnership Program, and Emergency Solutions Grant Funds for Federal Fiscal Years 2021, 2022, and 2023; and authorize the City Manager to execute the revised agreement.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- The County of Riverside is currently in the process of applying for Urban County qualification with the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) for Federal Fiscal Years 2021, 2022, and 2023.
- In order for the County to participate and receive program funding for the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG), Home Investment Partnership (HOME), and Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) programs, the County must qualify as an Urban County.
- As part of the HUD application process, the County must have Cooperation Agreements (Agreement) established with participating cities that cover the Urban County qualification period, and the City must enter into an Agreement with the County to be eligible to receive CDBG funds and to apply for HOME and ESG program funds.
- On June 16, 2020, Council adopted a resolution authorizing the City's participation in Riverside County's Urban County Program, and staff executed the Agreement.
- HUD requested minor modifications to the Resolution and Agreement.

FISCAL IMPACT

There is no fiscal impact associated with approval of the Agreement. Renewing the City's agreement with the County would provide a three-year revenue source for eligible CDBG projects.

BACKGROUND/ANALYSIS

The Housing and Community Development Act of 1974 (Act) funds the CDBG program. The CDBG program in turn provides grants from HUD to local governments to provide adequate housing, suitable living environments, and expansion of economic opportunities to persons of very low, low, and moderate income. The City has participated in the CDBG program since 1983. The County's Economic Development Agency is in the process of requalifying as an Urban County with HUD, enabling the County to receive annual CDBG, HOME, and ESG program funds. The County acts as the intermediary between HUD and the City in the distribution of CDBG funds.

City participation in the County's CDBG program automatically allows participation in the HOME and ESG programs. These programs do not require City staff support or funding; the City acts as a liaison by providing program information to interested residents.

The City of La Quinta recently approved and submitted the Cooperation Agreement with the County for the CDBG, ESG, and HOME programs for the 2021-2024 Urban County cycle.

HUD has notified the County that minor, but necessary, changes are needed in the Agreement and resolution. The changes do not affect the legality or enforceability of the original agreements. The primary change is the reference to Federal Fiscal Years 2021, 2022, and 2023 in the agreement and resolution. The other modifications included:

- 1. Modification to Paragraph 4C by adding "Section 109 of Title I of the Act", and "Title II of the American with Disabilities Act";
- 2. Modification to Paragraph 21 by replacing the original clause with the following: "The City may not sell, trade, or otherwise transfer all or any portion of such funds to another such metropolitan city, urban county, unit of general local government, or Indian tribe, or insular area that directly or indirectly receives CDBG funds in exchange for any other funds, credits or non-Federal considerations. City must use such funds for activities eligible under title I of the Act."

ALTERNATIVES

Staff does not recommend an alternative.

COOPERATION AGREEMENT FOR THE COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANT, HOME INVESTMENT PARTNERSHIP PROGRAM, AND EMERGENCY SOLUTIONS GRANT FOR FEDERAL FISCAL YEARS 2021, 2022, AND 2023

This Cooperation Agreement for the Community Development Block Grant, HOME Investment Partnership Program, and the Emergency Solutions Grant for Federal Fiscal Years 2021, 2022, and 2023, hereinafter referred to as "Agreement," is made and entered into this ______ day of _______, 2020, by and between the COUNTY OF RIVERSIDE, a political subdivision of the State of California, hereinafter referred to as "COUNTY", and CITY of CITY of LA QUINTA, an incorporated municipality within the geographical boundaries of the COUNTY, hereinafter referred to as "CITY," who together are sometimes referred to herein individually as "Party" or collectively as the "Parties."

RECITALS

WHEREAS, the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974, as amended (Public Law 93-383), hereinafter called "ACT," provides that Community Development Block Grant, funds hereinafter referred to as "CDBG," may be used for the support of activities that provide decent housing, suitable living environments, and expanded economic opportunities principally for persons of low and moderate-income; and

WHEREAS, the HOME Investment Partnerships Act program, hereinafter referred to as "HOME," was enacted as Title II of the National Affordable Housing Act of 1990, for the purposes of: expanding the supply of decent, affordable housing for low and very-low income families with emphasis on rental housing; building State and local capacity to carry out affordable housing programs; and providing for coordinated assistance to participants in the development of affordable low-income housing; and

WHEREAS, the Emergency Solutions Grant, hereinafter referred to as "ESG," was authorized by the McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act of 1987 and the Homeless Emergency Assistance and Rapid Transition to Housing (HEARTH) Act of 2009. The objectives of the ESG program are to increase the number and quality of emergency shelters and transitional

housing facilities for homeless individuals and families, to operate these facilities and provide essential social services, and to help prevent homelessness.

WHEREAS, CDBG regulations requires an eligible county to re-qualify as Urban County under the CDBG program every three (3) years; and

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual covenants herein set forth and the mutual benefits to be derived there from, the Parties agree as follows:

1. GENERAL.

- (a). This Agreement gives COUNTY authority to undertake, or assist in undertaking, activities in Program Years 2021-22, 2022-23, and 2023-24, that will be funded from the CDBG, HOME, and ESG programs and from any program income generated from the expenditure of such funds. COUNTY and CITY agree to cooperate, to undertake, or to assist in undertaking, community renewal and lower-income housing assistance activities. COUNTY is qualified as an "Urban County" under the ACT. CITY, by executing this Agreement, hereby gives notice of its election to participate in an Urban County's Community Development Block Grant (CDBG), Home Investment Partnership Act (HOME), and Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) programs, hereinafter referred to as "Urban County Programs".
- (b). By executing this Agreement, CITY understands that it may not apply for grants from appropriations under the Small Cities or State CDBG Programs for fiscal years during the period in which it participates in the Urban County's CDBG program and that CITY may only participate in the HOME program through the COUNTY'S Urban County Programs, not a HOME consortium. The CITY may also apply for HOME funds from the State of California, if permitted by the State.
- (c). By executing this Agreement, CITY understands that it may only receive a formula allocation of ESG funds through the COUNTY'S Urban County Programs. The CITY may also apply for ESG funds from the State of California, if permitted by the State.

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2. TERM.

The term of this Agreement shall be for three (3) years commencing on July 1, 2021, through June 30, 2024, unless an earlier date of termination is fixed by U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development, hereinafter referred to as HUD, pursuant to ACT.

COUNTY shall notify CITY of CITY's right not to participate in the next three-year period no later than the date specified by HUD in the *Urban County Qualification Notice*. CITY shall notify COUNTY no later than the date specified in COUNTY's notification that CITY elects not to participate in the next three-year Urban County Program. COUNTY shall send copies of all notifications required by this Paragraph to the HUD Field Office.

The terms of this Agreement shall remain in effect until the CDBG, HOME, and ESG funds and program income received with respect to activities carried out during the three-year qualification period are expended and the funded activities completed. Furthermore, neither the COUNTY nor the CITY may terminate or withdraw from this Agreement while it remains in effect.

3. <u>PREPARATION OF FEDERALLY REQUIRED FUNDING</u> APPLICATIONS.

The Riverside County Department of Housing, Homelessness Prevention, and Workforce Solutions, subject to approval of COUNTY's Board of Supervisors, shall be responsible for preparing and submitting to HUD, in a timely manner, all reports and statements required by the ACT and the Federal regulations promulgated by HUD to secure entitlement grant funding under the CDBG, HOME, and ESG programs. This duty shall include the preparation and processing of COUNTY Housing, Community, and Economic Development Needs Identification Report, Citizen Participation Plan, the County Five-Year Consolidated Plan, One-Year Action Plan, Consolidated Annual Performance and Evaluation Report (CAPER), and other related programs which satisfy the application requirements of ACT and its regulations.

 $Cooperation\ Agreement\ For\ CDBG,\ HOME,\ and\ ESG\ Funds\ for\ Federal\ Fiscal\ Years\ 2021-2023$

4. COMPLIANCE WITH FEDERAL STATUTES, REGULATIONS AND OTHER APPLICABLE STATUTES, REGULATIONS AND ORDINANCES.

- COUNTY and CITY will comply with the applicable provisions of the ACT (a) and those Federal regulations promulgated by HUD pursuant thereto, as the same currently exists or may hereafter be amended.
- (b) The COUNTY and CITY are hereby obligated to take all actions necessary to assure compliance with COUNTY's certification regarding affirmatively furthering fair housing pursuant to Section 104 (b) of Title I of ACT, as amended.
- (c) The COUNTY and CITY are hereby obligated to take all actions necessary to assure compliance with Section 109 of Title I of the Act, which incorporates Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, Title II of the American with Disabilities Act, and the Age Discrimination Act of 1975.
- (d) COUNTY and CITY shall comply with the applicable provisions of the following: National Environmental Policy Act of 1969; Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and Title VIII of the Civil Rights Act of 1968; the Fair Housing Act; Title 24 Code of Federal Regulations part 570; Cranston-Gonzales National Affordable housing Act (Public Law 101-625); Executive Order 11063, as amended by Executive Order 12259; Executive Order 11988; the Uniform Relocation Assistance and Real Property Acquisition Policies Act of 1970 (42 U.S.C.§4630, et. seq.); and other Federal or state statute or regulation applicable to the use of CDBG, HOME Investment Partnerships Act (enacted as Title II of the National Affordable Housing Act of 1990), and Emergency Solutions Grant funds.
- (e) CITY agrees that the Urban County Program funding for activities in, or in support of, the CITY are prohibited if CITY does not affirmatively further fair housing within CITY'S jurisdiction or impedes COUNTY actions to comply with its fair housing certification.
- (f) CITY and COUNTY shall meet the citizen participation requirements of 24 CFR 570.301 and provide Riverside County citizens with all of the following:
- i. The estimate of the amount of CDBG funds proposed to be used for activities that will benefit persons of low and moderate-income;

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ii. A plan for minimizing displacement of persons as a result of activities assisted with CDBG funds and to assist persons actually displaced as a result of such activities:

- iii. A plan that provides for and encourages citizen participation, with particular emphasis on participation by persons of low and moderate-incomes, residents of slum and blighted areas, and of areas in which funds are proposed to be used, and provides for participation of residents in low and moderate-income neighborhoods;
- iv. Reasonable and timely access to local meetings, information, and records relating to the grantee's proposed use of funds, as required by the regulations of the Secretary, and relating to the actual use of funds under the ACT;
- Provide for public meetings to obtain citizen views and to respond v. to proposals and questions at all stages of the community development program, including at least the development of needs, the review of proposed activities and review of program performance. Meetings shall be held after adequate notice, at times and locations convenient to potential or actual beneficiaries, and with accommodation for the disabled.
- CITY shall develop a community development plan, for the period of this (g) Agreement, which identifies community development and housing needs and specifies both short and long-term community development objectives.
 - (h) CITY certifies, to the best of its knowledge and belief, that:
- i. No Federal appropriated funds have been paid or will be paid, by or on behalf of the CITY, to any person influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of any agency, a Member of Congress, an officer or employee of Congress, or an employee of a Member of Congress, in connection with the awarding of any Federal contract, the making of any Federal grant, the making of any Federal loan, the entering into of any cooperative agreement, and the extension, continuation, renewal, amendment or modification of any Federal contract, grant, loan or cooperative agreement.
- ii. If any funds other than Federally-appropriated funds have been paid or will be paid to any person for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of

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any agency, a Member of Congress, an officer or employee of Congress, or an employee of a Member of Congress, in connection with this Federal contract, grant, loan, or cooperative agreement, the undersigned shall complete and submit standard Form-LLL, "Disclosure Form to Report Lobbying", in accordance with its instructions.

- iii. The CITY shall require that the language provided in Section 4(e)(i) and (ii) of this Agreement be included in the award documents for all sub-awards at all tiers (including subcontracts, sub- grants and contracts under grants, loans, and cooperative agreements) and that all sub-recipients shall certify and disclose accordingly. This certification is a material representation of fact upon which reliance was placed when this transaction was made or entered into.
- (i) CITY certifies that it has adopted and is enforcing a policy prohibiting the use of excessive force by law enforcement agencies within its jurisdiction against any individuals engaged in non-violent civil rights demonstrations, and that it has adopted and is enforcing applicable State and local laws against physically barring entrance to, or exit from, a facility or location which is the subject of such non-violent civil rights demonstrations within its jurisdiction.

5. COMPLIANCE WITH POLICY AND PROGRAM OBJECTIVES.

The COUNTY's Board of Supervisors have adopted policies and procedures to ensure efficient and effective administration of the CDBG, HOME, and ESG programs. COUNTY will provide these policies and procedures to CITY within a reasonable time after this Agreement's commencement date. COUNTY and City agree to comply with these said policies and program objectives and to take no actions to obstruct implementation of the approved 2019-2024 and subsequent Five Year Consolidated Plans.

6. OTHER AGREEMENTS.

Pursuant to Federal regulations at 24 CFR 570.501(b), CITY is subject to the same requirements applicable to sub-recipients, including the requirement of a written agreement set forth in Federal regulations at 24 CFR 570.503. For each fiscal year during the term of this Agreement, COUNTY and CITY shall enter into an additional agreement, commonly known as a Supplemental Agreement, that will have a term coinciding with a CDBG Program Year and

Cooperation Agreement For CDBG.

enumerate the project(s) CITY will implement with its entitlement funds. Said Supplemental Agreement will set forth the time schedule for completion of said project(s) and any funding sources, in addition to entitlement funds, that will be used in completing the project(s). If substantial compliance with the completion schedule, due to unforeseen or uncontrollable circumstances, cannot be met by CITY, the schedule for the project(s) may be extended by COUNTY. If COUNTY determines that substantial progress toward drawdown of funds is not made during the term of the Supplemental Agreement, the entitlement funds associated with the project(s) may be reprogrammed by COUNTY, to other activities as determined by COUNTY, after COUNTY provides appropriate written notice to CITY. COUNTY's decision not to extend the completion schedule associated with the project(s), or to reprogram the entitlement funds associated with the project(s), will not excuse CITY from complying with terms of this Agreement.

7. <u>DETERMINATION OF PROJECTS TO BE FUNDED AND DISTRIBUTION OF ENTITLEMENT FUNDS.</u>

CITY agrees to submit to COUNTY, no later than the date specified by COUNTY prior to each program year, the activities that the CITY desires to implement with its entitlement funds, said designation to comply with statutory and regulatory provisions governing citizen's participation. Said designation is to be reviewed by COUNTY to determine that the projects are eligible under Federal regulations for funding and inclusion in the One Year Action Plan of the County's Five-Year Consolidated Plan and consistent with both Federal and COUNTY policy governing use of Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds.

In the event that CITY fails to submit to COUNTY the identified activities that the CITY desires to implement with its entitlement funds by the date specified prior to each program year, the COUNTY may determine the activities to be funded, without consent of the CITY, consistent with both Federal and COUNTY policy governing use of Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds.

Consistent with Paragraphs 3, 4, 5, 6, and 7 of this Agreement, COUNTY's Board of Supervisors will make the final determination of the distribution and disposition of all CDBG funds received by COUNTY pursuant to the ACT.

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8. <u>COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANT MANUAL</u>.

CITY warrants that those officers, employees, and agents, retained by it and responsible for implementing projects funded with CDBG have received, reviewed, and will follow the Community Development Block Grant Manual that has been prepared and amended by COUNTY, and by this reference, said Manual is incorporated herein and made a part hereof.

9. <u>REAL PROPERTY ACQUIRED OR PUBLIC FACILITY</u> CONSTRUCTED WITH CDBG FUNDS.

When CDBG funds are used, in whole or in part, by CITY to acquire real property or to construct a public facility, CITY will comply with the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969 (42 U.S.C. §§4321, et seq.), the California Environmental Quality Act (Cal. Pub. Resources Code §§21000, et seq.), the Uniform Relocation Assistance and Real Property Acquisition Policies Act of 1970 (42 U.S.C. §§4630, et seq.), and the California Government Code Sections 7260 et seq., as those Acts may be amended from time-to-time and any Federal or state regulations issued to implement the aforementioned laws.

In addition, the following is to occur:

- (a) Title to the real property shall vest in CITY;
- (b) The real property title will be held by or the constructed facility will be maintained by the CITY for the approved use until five (5) years after the date that the project is reported as "Completed" within the annual Consolidated Annual Performance and Evaluation Report.
- (c) While held by CITY, the real property or the constructed facility is to be used exclusively for the purpose for which acquisition or construction was originally approved by COUNTY;
- (d) CITY shall provide timely notice to COUNTY of any action which would result in a modification or change in the use of the real property purchased or improved, in whole or in part, with CDBG or HOME funds from that planned at the time of acquisition or improvement, including disposition.

1	(e) CITY shall provide timely notice to citizens and opportunity to comment
2	on any proposed modification or change;
3	(f) Written approval from COUNTY must be secured if the property or the
4	facility is to be put to an alternate use that is or is not consistent with Federal regulations governing
5	CDBG funds;
6	(g) Should CITY desire during the five (5) year period to use the real property
7	or the constructed facility for a purpose not consistent with applicable Federal regulations
8	governing CDBG funds or to sell the real property or facility, then:
9	(i) If CITY desires to retain title, it will have to reimburse either COUNTY
10	or the Federal government an amount that represents the percentage of current fair market value
11	that is identical to the percentage that CDBG funds initially comprised to when the property was
12	acquired or the facility was constructed;
13	(ii) If CITY sells the property or facility, or is required to sell the property
14	or facility, CITY is to reimburse the COUNTY an amount that represents the percentage of
15	proceeds realized by the sale that is identical to the percentage that CDBG funds comprised of the
16	monies paid to initially acquire the property or construct the facility. This percentage amount will
17	be calculated after deducting all actual and reasonable cost of sale from the sale proceeds.
18	10. <u>DISPOSITION OF INCOME GENERATED BY THE EXPENDITURE</u>
19	OF CDBG FUNDS.
20	CITY shall inform COUNTY of any income generated by the expenditure of
21	CDBG funds received by CITY from COUNTY. CITY may not retain any program income so
22	generated. Any and all program income shall be returned to the County and may only be used for
23	eligible activities in accordance with all CDBG requirements, including all requirements for citizen
24	participation.
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The COUNTY is required by HUD to monitor and report the receipt and use of all program income. CITY is required to track, monitor, and report any and all program income as requested by COUNTY.

11. TERMINATION.

Except as provided for in Paragraph 2, CITY and COUNTY cannot terminate or withdraw from this Agreement while it remains in effect.

12. <u>FORMER AGREEMENTS UTILIZING COMMUNITY</u> DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANT FUNDS BETWEEN COUNTY AND CITY.

All agreements between CITY and COUNTY regarding the use of CDBG funds for fiscal years 1975-76 through 2020-2021, and any Supplemental Agreements thereunder, shall remain in full force and effect. If the language of this Agreement is in conflict or inconsistent with the terms of any prior said agreements between CITY and COUNTY, the language of this Agreement will be controlling.

13. INDEMNIFICATION

CITY agrees to indemnify, defend and hold harmless COUNTY and its authorized officers, employees, agents, and volunteers from any and all claims, actions, losses, damages, and/or liability arising from CITY acts, errors or omissions and for any costs or expenses incurred by COUNTY on account of any claim therefore, except where such indemnifications is prohibited by law. CITY shall promptly notify COUNTY in writing of the occurrence of any such claims, actions, losses, damages, and/or liability. CITY shall indemnify and hold harmless COUNTY against any liability, claims, losses, demands, and actions incurred by COUNTY as a result of the determination by HUD or its successor that activities undertaken by CITY under the program(s) fail to comply with any laws, regulations, or policies applicable thereto or that any funds billed by and disbursed to CITY under this Agreement were improperly expended.

14. <u>COMPLIANCE WITH LAWS AND REGULATIONS.</u>

By executing this Agreement, the Parties hereby certify that they will adhere to and comply with all applicable Federal, state, and local laws, regulations, and ordinances.

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It is expressly agreed that this Agreement embodies the entire agreement of the Parties in relation to the subject matter hereof, and that no other agreement or understanding, verbal or otherwise, relative to this subject matter, exists between the Parties at the time of execution.

16. SEVERABILITY.

ENTIRE AGREEMENT.

15.

Each paragraph and provision of this Agreement is severable from each other provision, and if any provision or part thereof is declared invalid, the remaining provisions shall remain in full force and effect.

17. <u>ASSIGNMENT</u>.

The Parties will not make any sale, assignment, conveyance or lease of any trust or power, or transfer in any other form with respect to this Agreement, without prior written approval of the other Party.

18. INTERPRETATION AND GOVERNING LAW.

This Agreement and any dispute arising hereunder shall be governed by and interpreted in accordance with the laws of the State of California. This Agreement shall be construed as a whole according to its fair language and common meaning to achieve the objectives and purposes of the Parties hereto, and the rule of construction to the effect that ambiguities are to be resolved against the drafting Party shall not be employed in interpreting this Agreement, all Parties having been represented by counsel in the negotiation and preparation hereof.

19. WAIVER.

Failure by a Party to insist upon the strict performance of any of the provisions of this Agreement by the other Party, or the failure by a Party to exercise its rights upon the default of the other Party, shall not constitute a waiver of such Party's right to insist and demand strict compliance by the other Party with the terms of this Agreement thereafter.

20. JURISDICTION AND VENUE.

Any action at law or in equity arising under this Agreement or brought by a Party hereto for the purpose of enforcing, construing or determining the validity of any provision of this

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Agreement shall be filed in the Superior Court of California, County of Riverside, State of California, and the Parties hereto waive all provisions of law providing for the filing, removal or change of venue to any other court or jurisdiction.

21. PROHIBITION OF CDBG FUND TRANSFER

The City may not sell, trade, or otherwise transfer all or any portion of such funds to another such metropolitan city, urban county, unit of general local government, or Indian tribe, or insular area that directly or indirectly receives CDBG funds in exchange for any other funds, credits or non-Federal considerations. City must use such funds for activities eligible under title I of the ACT.

22. EMERGENCY SOLUTIONS GRANT FORMULA ALLOCATION

CITY acknowledges that while participating in the COUNTY's Urban County program, CITY can only receive a formula Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) allocation from the Urban County program and only at such times as authorized by the Board of Supervisors. The CITY and COUNTY may also apply for ESG funds from the State of California, if permitted by the State.

23. **HOME INVESTMENT PARTNERSHIP ACT FORMULA** ALLOCATION

CITY acknowledges that while participating in the COUNTY's Urban County program, CITY can only receive a formula HOME allocation from the Urban County program and only at such times as authorized by the Board of Supervisors. The CITY and COUNTY may also apply for HOME funds from the State of California, if permitted by the State.

24. **AMENDMENTS**

No change, amendment, or modification to the Agreement shall be valid or binding upon CITY or COUNTY unless such change, amendment, or modification is in writing and duly executed. CITY and COUNTY agree to adopt any necessary amendments to this Agreement to incorporate changes required by HUD as set forth in the Urban County Qualification Notice. Amendments must be submitted to HUD as provided in the Urban County Qualification Notice and failure to do so will void the automatic renewal for such qualification period.

24. 1 AUTHORITY TO EXECUTE. 2 The persons executing this Agreement or exhibits attached hereto on behalf of the 3 Parties to this Agreement hereby warrant and represent that they have the authority to execute 4 this Agreement and warrant and represent that they have the authority to bind the respective 5 Parties to this Agreement to the performance of its obligations hereunder. 6 25. AGENDA TITLE: APPROVE FIRST ROUND COMMUNITY SERVICES GRANTS FOR FISCAL YEAR 2020/21

RECOMMENDATION

Approve first round Community Service Grants for fiscal year 2020/21.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- Council considers Community Services Grants and Economic Development/Marketing funding requests three times per fiscal year.
- Eleven grant applications were received and reviewed by the Community Services Grant Ad Hoc Committee (Committee).

FISCAL IMPACT

The total 2020/21 grant budget is \$60,000 (Account No. 101-3001-60510) allocated to Community Service Grants. Eleven organizations submitted a total of \$49,946 in grant requests. The Committee recommends funding \$27,800 of these requests. If approved, the remaining budget would be \$32,200.

BACKGROUND/ANALYSIS

Grants are awarded to 501(c)3 non-profit groups and organizations that benefit La Quinta residents and strengthen the business community. Grants are limited to \$5,000 per request and consecutive fiscal year funding is not allowed (Attachment 1).

Council created a Starter Grant category for organizations applying for the first time. This allows first time applicants up to \$500 of funding and eligibility to apply again the next fiscal year.

The Committee, comprised of Mayor Evans and Mayor Pro-Tem Peña, reviewed the applications and recommended the following:

COMMUNITY SERVICES GRANT OVERVIEW

The City of La Quinta offers a grant program for community services support.

- Community Services Grants go to recognized nonprofit organizations that benefit the residents of La Quinta.
- Grants are considered and funded up to three times per year (rounds).
- All three rounds are held within the city's fiscal year (July 1 June 30).
- Organizations that have been funded are ineligible for funding for the next fiscal year.
- All funding requests are limited to an amount not to exceed \$5,000.

IS MY ORGANIZATION ELIGIBLE?

Q: How much money is available?

A: Requests are limited to an amount not to exceed \$5,000. Any funding amount requested could be adjusted to a lesser amount at the discretion and approval of the City Council.

Q: Who can apply for this grant?

A: Applications are accepted from recognized nonprofit organizations that directly benefit La Quinta residents. Second consideration is given to nonprofit organizations that indirectly affect the quality of life for the residents of La Quinta.

Q: Can an individual apply for this grant?

A: No, individuals are not eligible for funding through the City of La Quinta grant program.

Q: What if my organization is applying for a grant for the first time?

A: Organizations applying to the Community Services Grant program for the first time are eligible for a "Starter Grant" The "Starter Grant" allows first time applicants grant funding up to \$500 if they demonstrate their commitment to provide services to the La Quinta community. If an organization is selected to receive the "Starter Grant" they would then be eligible to apply to the program again the next fiscal year.

Q: Can my organization request "seed" money for a start-up?

A: Yes, organizations can request "seed" money, however they are required to obtain matching funds from other sources in the <u>same fiscal year</u> before the grant funds will be released.

Q: Is my organization eligible if we received Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds?

A: No, organizations that receive CDBG funds from the City of La Quinta during the same fiscal year are not eligible for funding.

Q: Is my organization eligible if we received Community Services Grant (CSG) funds in the past?

A: Yes, and No. Organizations that were funded <u>before June 30, 2019</u> are now eligible to apply. Organizations that were funded after July 1, 2019 are ineligible for funding and must wait until July 1, 2021 to re-apply.

THE PROCESS...

What you need to do:

- 1. Determine eligibility based on the information provided above. If eligible, proceed to step 2.
- 2. Review the grants calendar for submission dates (in red). If within due date, proceed to step 3.
- 3. Fill out the grant application. Once completed proceed to step 4.
- 4. Submit application via email to ccalderon@laquintaca.gov, or in person to the Wellness Center.
 - a. The Wellness Center is located at 78450 Avenida La Fonda, La Quinta, CA 92253.

The next steps:

- 5. Applications are received and reviewed by staff to ensure eligibility and completeness.
- 6. Completed grant applications will be reviewed by a designated Grant Review Committee (in blue).
 - a. The committee's review includes: consideration of the funding amount, the intended use of the funds, and the organizations service to the community. If the committee approves the application, they will then recommend for approval to the City Council.
- 7. Committee approved applications are submitted to the City Council for consideration and approval (in green)
- 8. If approved, funds will be dispersed to grantee (in white) and can be spent over a 12 month period.
- 9. Funding expenditures will need to be reported to the city at 6 months and a full reconciliation form with supporting documentation will be due before the end of the 12 month period.

- Marketing/Sponsorship Grants go to nonprofit organizations that would benefit the City of La Quinta in a marketing capacity.
- Economic Development Grants go to organizations that will help strengthen the business community in La Quinta.
- Grants are considered and funded up to three times per year (rounds).
- Organizations that have been funded are ineligible for funding for the next fiscal year.
- All three rounds are held within the city's fiscal year (July 1- June 30).
- All funding requests must include a detailed marketing/media plan to be considered.

IS MY ORGANIZATION ELIGIBLE?

Q: How much money is available?

A: Requests are limited to an amount not to exceed \$5,000. A second tier is available for Economic Development/Marketing requests above \$5,000 (submission of a detailed marketing/media plan is required). For Economic Development/Marketing requests above \$5,000, an in depth review will be conducted by the La Quinta Marketing Committee. Q: Is my organization eligible if we received Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds?

A: No, organizations that receive CDBG funds from the City of La Quinta during the same fiscal year are not eligible for funding.

Q: Is my organization eligible if we received Community Services Grant (CSG) funds in the past?

A: Yes, and No. Organizations that were funded <u>before June 30, 2019</u> are now eligible to apply. Organizations that were funded <u>after July 1, 2019</u> are ineligible for funding and must wait until <u>July 1, 2021</u> to re-apply.

THE PROCESS...

What you need to do:

- 1. Determine eligibility based on the information provided above. If eligible, proceed to step 2.
- 2. Review the grants calendar for submission dates (in red). If within due date, proceed to step 3.
- 3. Fill out the grant application. Once completed proceed to step 4.
- 4. Submit application via email to ccalderon@laquintaca.gov, or in person to the Wellness Center.
 - a. The Wellness Center is located at 78450 Avenida La Fonda, La Quinta, CA 92253.

The next steps:

- 5. Applications are received and reviewed by staff to ensure eligibility and completeness.
- Completed grant applications will be reviewed by a designated Grant Review Committee (in blue).
 - a. The committee's review includes: consideration of the funding amount, the included marketing/media plans, and the amount of impressions and visitors the event would bring to the city. If the committee approves the application, they will then recommend approval to the City Council.
- 7. Committee approved applications are submitted to the City Council for consideration and approval (in green)
- 8. If approved, funds will be dispersed to grantee (in white) and can be spent over a 12 month period.
- 9. Funding expenditures will need to be reported to the city at 6 months and a full reconciliation form with supporting documentation will be due before the end of the 12 month period.

Recommended Grant Requests:

- 1. Animal Samaritans is requesting \$5,000 in funding to be used towards their Adoption Alliance Rescue Program that rescues adoptable, at-risk animals (puppies, kittens, dogs, and cats whose time is running out at local shelters) and provides them a safe haven until they are adopted. This involves coordinating with pet fosters, arranging transportation and placement with fellow no-kill shelters and rescue groups. Since the inception of this program more than 11,000 healthy animals have been saved from being euthanized. This organization was last funded \$2,500 in 2018/19. The Grant Review Committee recommends funding \$2,500.
- 2. Coachella Valley Autism Society is requesting \$5,000 in funding to be used towards battling isolation due to COVID-19 and provide virtual social recreational activities for families and youth affected by autism. This organization was last funded a \$500 Starter Grant in 2016/17. The Grant Review Committee recommends funding \$2,000.
- 3. Coachella Valley Waterkeeper is requesting a Starter Grant in the amount of \$500 to help start of the virtual Watershed Explorers. Grant funds would be used to purchase a Lavalier microphone that would be used to in recording videos outside during virtual tours of the natural spaces within our watershed. This piece of equipment would assist with providing a higher sound quality so that the speaker can be heard by all participating students. Coachella Valley Waterkeeper is a first-time applicant to the Community Services Grant program. The Grant Review Committee recommends funding \$500.
- 4. Desert Cancer Foundation (DCF) is requesting \$5,000 in funding to be used to pay for co-insurance/co-pays for Coachella Valley residents undergoing cancer treatment that are uninsured/underinsured, live at or below 300% of the Federal Poverty guidelines, and indicate a financial need for assistance to pay for their cancer treatment. This organization was last funded a \$3,000 Starter Grant in 2018/19. The Grant Review Committee recommends funding \$3,500.
- 5. Habitat for Humanity of the Coachella Valley (HFHCV)is requesting \$5,000 to be used to support "A Brush with Kindness" program that provides assistance to low-income households at risk of housing or financial insecurity, including seniors, the disabled, communities of color, veterans and struggling families. This organization was last funded \$5,000 in 2016/17. The Grant Review Committee recommends funding \$5,000. The committee also requested that HFHCV work with City staff to connect homes identified by Code Enforcement in need of assistance to see if they qualify for this program.
- 6. HARC, Inc. is requesting \$5,000 in funding to be used towards staff hours to continue to provide the community with free population health data for the Coachella Valley. This data enables local organizations to understand the key issues facing our community as well as the health inequities that exist. This organization was last funded \$5,000 in 2018/19. The Grant Review Committee recommends funding \$2,500.
- 7. JFK Foundation Ophelia Project is requesting \$5,000 in funding to be used for program support and the expansion of the Ophelia Project into John Glenn Middle School, feeder school to La Quinta High School. The cost is \$350 per student_per

- year to participate in this program. This organization was last funded \$2,500 in 2018/19. The Grant Review Committee recommends funding \$5,000. The committee request that the funding be made in honor of Bill Powers.
- 8. KVCR TV-Inland Futures Foundation is requesting \$5,000 to support the production of season 2 of the television show "Uncovered in the Archives". This organization was last funded a \$500 Starter Grant in 2016/17. **The Grant Review Committee recommends funding \$1,000**.
- 9. Palm Desert La Quinta Youth Football (PDLQ) is requesting \$5,000 to be used to purchase new equipment such as helmets, helmet face shields, and shoulder pads for participants in tackle football. This organization was last funded \$1,000 in 2018/19. The Grant Review Committee recommends funding \$2,500. The committee requests that the equipment purchased with this funding meets the guidelines and standards for safety under the California Youth Football Act AB-1.
- 10. Palm Springs Cultural Center is requesting \$5,000 in funding to be used to reduce the COVID-19 related operational costs projected for the 2020/21 Certified Farmers Market La Quinta. The market will operate from October 2020 to April 2021 in Old Town La Quinta. This organization was last funded \$1,000 in 2018/19. The Grant Review Committee recommends funding \$2,800.

Grant Requests not recommended for funding and/or did not meet the criteria in the Grant Guidelines include:

11. San Bernardino Sexual Assault Services Coachella Valley is requesting \$5,000 to be used to provide a safe and free family drive-in movie event in La Quinta for 2 evenings on October 17 & 18. This funding will cover costs for audio/visual services and movie authorization. San Bernardino Sexual Assault Services Coachella Valley is a first-time applicant to the Community Services Grant program. The Grant Review Committee does not recommend funding this organization at this time. The committee did request that City staff work with this organization to promote the services they provide to the residents of La Quinta.

FISCAL IMPACT

BACKGROUND/ANALYSIS

Every year, residents submit nominations for the City's Veteran Recognition Program. Staff reviews the nominations to ensure they meet the City's criteria and then submits the nominations for Council consideration. If selected, their name, rank, and dates of service are engraved on the Veterans Acknowledgement monument. Program requirements include:

- active military who served in 1954 and after must be a past or current resident for a minimum of three years;
- active military who served in 1953 and before must be a past or current resident; no minimum years;
- honorable discharge from service; and
- proof of military service.

All branches of the military identified by the Department of Veterans Affairs, including reservists, who served a minimum of six years and merchant marines who served in active duty, are considered.

As part of the Veteran's Day Recognition, Council will recognize each veteran with a certificate of appreciation and call attention to the art piece with their newly added name.

AGENDA TITLE: APPROVE ART INSTALLATIONS FOR TWO ROUNDABOUTS IN THE LA QUINTA VILLAGE BY ARTIST SAGE VAUGHN

RECOMMENDATION

Approve the installation of flower sculptures by artist Sage Vaughn at the Avenida Bermudas and Calle Tampico and Avenida Bermudas and Calle Sinaloa roundabouts in the La Quinta Village; and authorize City staff to execute an agreement for this project.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- The Community Services Commission (Commission) identified the two roundabouts as art opportunities.
- On July 22, 2020, Community Resources staff distributed a Request for Proposals (RFP) to the City's prequalified artist list and received proposals from renown artists.
- The Commission is recommending the Sage Vaughn flower sculptures (Sculptures) for Council approval because they are inspired by La Quinta's culture and will invigorate public spaces for the community to enjoy.
- The installation of the sculptures is driven by the Commission's goals and objectives to enhance quality of life for residents through public art.

FISCAL IMPACT

The total cost of the two sculpture installations is \$92,000 and funds are available in the Capital Improvement Program (CIP) budget (Account No. 401-0000-60188, Project No. 151603). Upon completion of this project, \$75,000 will remain in the Art in Public Places fund.

BACKGROUND/ANALYSIS

In September 2019, the Commission developed a roadmap that serves as a framework for staff and keeps items at top of mind for future Commissioners. The roadmap includes an initiative to identify spaces for art installations across the City.

The Village Complete Streets project will feature 5 new roundabouts and the Commission listed them as art opportunity locations because of their proximity to the Old Town Shopping corridor and their design is primed for art.

At the November 12, 2019 meeting, the Commission created the Roundabout Art Subcommittee (Subcommittee), comprised of two Community Service Commissioners and two Cove Neighborhood Association members to identify which roundabouts will be the first to get art and allocate funding. The Subcommittee recommended the following:

- Program the two roundabouts (Attachment 1); and
- Allocate \$47,500 for each roundabout to secure a large art piece that complements each roundabout; and
- Program the three other roundabouts at a later date once additional funding is available.

The Commission agreed with the Subcommittee's recommendation and on July 22, an RFP was distributed to the City's prequalified artist list. The RFP closed on August 31, and on September 14 the Commission selected the sculptures (Attachment 2). Each sculpture is made of powder coated aluminum and was inspired by La Quinta. It features an array of local wildflowers and its shades of blues, oranges, and purples are reflective of the City's vibrant sunsets.

The sculptures will play a major role in enhancing the visual experience and add value to the cultural and economic vitality of La Quinta. They are located on a major roadway, will be visible to large volumes of vehicles and pedestrians, serve as a cultural asset, and contribute to the City's identity. If the Council approves the sculptures, Staff will execute an agreement and initiate the installation process with the artist, which will commence 30 days from Council approval.

Currently a total of \$600,000 is appropriated from the Art In Public Places Fund to purchase art project installations for four CIP projects (Dune Palms Bridge, La Quinta Village, SilverRock Event Site, Avenue 53 and Jefferson Roundabout).

On October 6, 2020, the installation of two art projects for CIP projects are being presented as follows:

- Two Roundabouts in the La Quinta Village for a total cost of \$92,000;
- Art mural on the southwest wall at the intersection of Fred Waring Drive and Adams Street for a total cost of \$13,500.

ALTERNATIVES

Council may reject the Sculptures and/or direct staff to solicit another RFP.

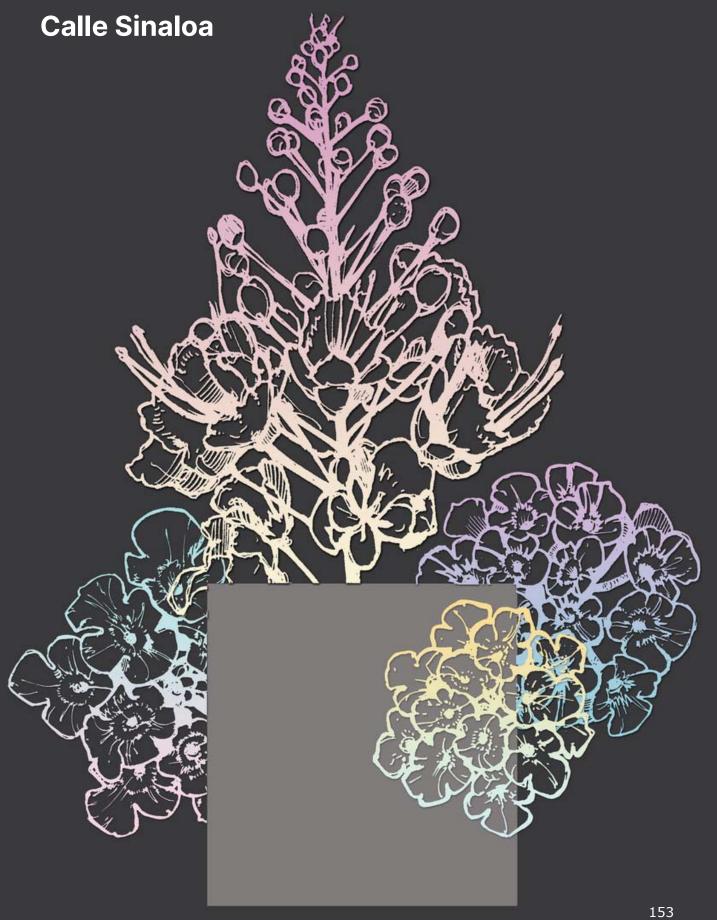


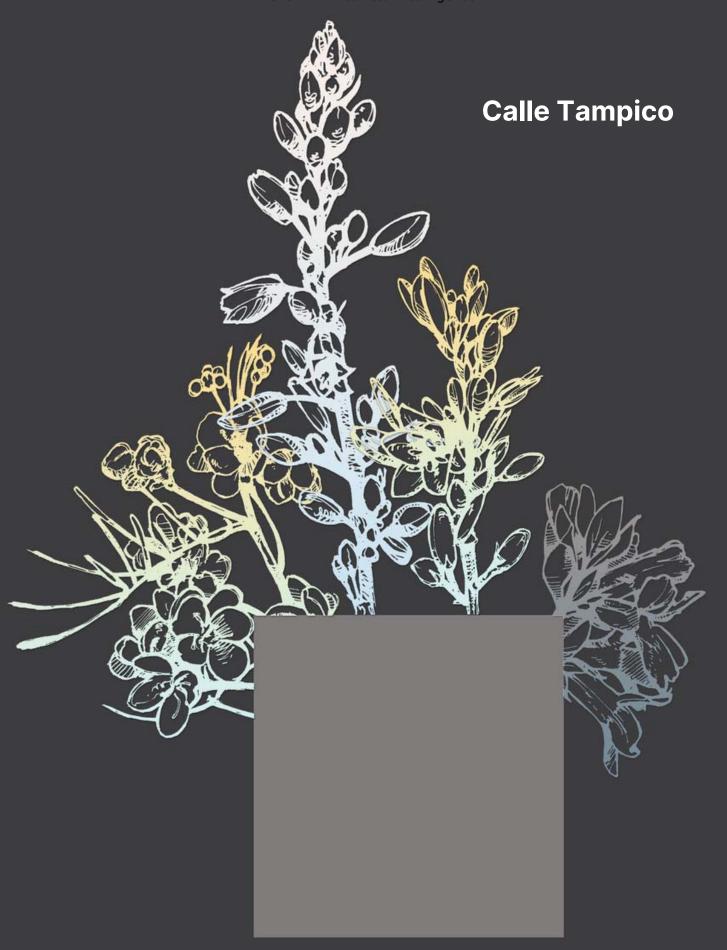

AGENDA TITLE: APPROVE ART INSTALLATION FOR A MURAL ON THE SOUTHWEST WALL OF FRED WARING DRIVE AND ADAMS STREET INTERSECTION BY ARTIST NATE FRIZZELL AND ASSOCIATED BUDGET ADJUSTMENTS FOR THE LA QUINTA LANDSCAPE RENOVATION IMPROVEMENT PROJECT NO. 2016-03

RECOMMENDATION

Approve art installation of a mural by artist Nate Frizzell on the southwest wall at the intersection of Fred Waring Drive and Adams Street; approve the associated budget adjustments to the La Quinta Landscape Renovation Improvement Project No. 2016-03; and authorize City staff to execute an agreement for this project.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- The Community Services Commission (Commission) identified the mural location as art opportunity.
- On July 22, 2020, Community Resources staff distributed a Request for Proposals (RFP) to the City's prequalified artist list and received proposals from renown artists.
- The Commission is recommending the Nate Frizzell mural (Mural) for Council approval because it is inspired by La Quinta's culture and will invigorate public spaces for the community to enjoy.
- The programming of the mural is driven by the Commission's goals and objectives to enhance quality of life for residents through public art.

FISCAL IMPACT

If approved, a budget adjustment in the Art in Public Places Fund, (Account No. 270-0000-99900, Transfers Out) would increase the revenue in the La Quinta Landscape Renovation Improvement Project No. 2016-03 within the CIP Fund for the art purchase by \$13,500. Upon completion of the Mural, \$61,500 will remain available for appropriation in the Art in Public Places Fund.

BACKGROUND/ANALYSIS

In September 2019, the Commission developed a roadmap that serves as a framework for staff and keeps items at top of mind for future Commissioners.

The roadmap includes an initiative to identify spaces for art installations across the City.

Part of the Commission's initiative includes programming artwork north of Highway 111. As a result, a mural art opportunity on the wall at the intersection of Fred Waring Drive and Adams Street was identified. On July 22, an RFP for a mural was published and closed on August 31. On September 14, the Commission selected the mural featuring the portrait of a woman holding a local finch on the bottom wall and complemented by two other finches on the top wall – both walls will be filled with flowers (Attachment 1). The Mural's features will create a tangible sense of place and contrast the bland color of concrete. Not only will it serve as entrance monument, it will also be the first hyper-realistic mural publicly available in the Coachella Valley.

The Mural will play a major role in enhancing the visual experience and add value to the cultural and economic vitality of La Quinta. It is located on a major roadway, will be visible to large volumes of vehicles and pedestrians, serve as a cultural asset, and contribute to the City's identity. If the Council approves the mural, Staff will execute an agreement and initiate the installation process with the artist, which will commence 30 days from Council approval.

Currently a total of \$600,000 is appropriated from the Art In Public Places Fund to purchase art project installations for four CIP projects (Dune Palms Bridge, La Quinta Village, SilverRock Event Site, Avenue 53 and Jefferson Roundabout). If the budget amendment is approved, the total budget would increase to \$613,500.

On October 6, 2020, the installation of two art projects for CIP projects are being presented as follows:

- Two Roundabouts in the La Quinta Village for a total cost of \$92,000;
- Art mural on the southwest wall at the intersection of Fred Waring Drive and Adams Street for a total cost of \$13,500.

If both these purchases and the budget amendment are approved, the remaining CIP art budget would be \$508,000.

ALTERNATIVES

Council may reject the proposal and/or direct staff to solicit another RFP.

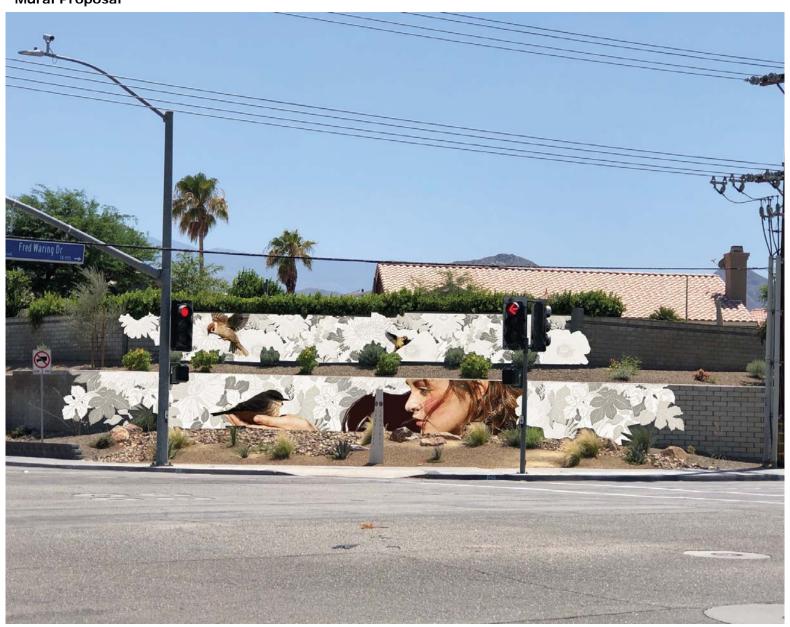

RECOMMENDATION

Discuss proposed updates to the Golf Cart Program and Map.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- The City's Golf Cart Program (Program) was initiated in July of 2007 and Ordinance No. 474 (Attachment 1) outlines the Program regulations.
- As part of the recent Capital Improvement Program (CIP) projects, staff has added golf cart routes as part of the striping improvements, when feasible.
- At the August 4, 2020 meeting, Council received an update on the Golf Cart Program and Map (Attachment 2) and had several questions regarding the regulations and map and requested that staff further review items and return for further consideration.

FISCAL IMPACT

None at this time, however, additional golf cart routes and paths could be included as part of future Capital Improvement Program (CIP) projects, and associated costs would be identified during the scoping and budgeting process for each qualified project.

BACKGROUND/ANALYSIS

At the August 4, 2020 meeting, Council received an update on the Program and Map showing routes and paths and had several questions on the regulations for staff to research and return for further consideration.

Electrically powered only: Current regulations define and require golf carts as electrically-powered. Both gas and electric-powered carts are used today. Neighborhood electric vehicles (NEVs) have been popularly used, efficient, cost-saving (long term), produce no fumes or emissions, and make little noise on golf courses. The Vehicle Code does not restrict use of gas-powered golf carts. The current restriction can be removed to allow both electrically and gas-powered golf carts.

Covered passenger compartment: Current regulations require a covered passenger compartment. Most golf carts (NEV and gas-powered) are designed with a covered passenger compartment, although there are some open convertible-style carts such as those used for landscape and maintenance. The covered passenger compartment does provide sunshade and safety protection in case of accidents, collision, or possible rollover of the vehicle, and this could be the reason it was included as a requirement. However, a covered passenger compartment is not a requirement of the Federal Motor Vehicle Safety Standard No. 500 (49 CFR 571.500) for Low Speed Vehicles. This restriction can be removed, or an exception provided for landscape and maintenance carts.

Permit decal visibly displayed on right rear fender: Current regulations require the permit decal be visibly displayed on the right rear fender. Code Compliance and Riverside County Sheriffs have no preference for display on the right or left side rear fender, but that placement is uniform (either right or left side) and visible.

No more than two persons: Current regulations define golf carts as designed to carry no more than two persons, including the driver. The maximum 2 persons is consistent with the definition of a golf cart per the Vehicle Code. Most golf carts are designed for two passengers, but there are some NEVs that have 4, 6, and even 8 passenger seats especially used for shuttle service. If consideration is to allow for golf carts greater than 2 passengers, it is recommended that all seats be equipped with seatbelts.

Sidewalks: Current regulations do not allow golf carts to operate on sidewalks, with the exception of maintenance crews employed by a state, federal, or local government with a permit. Per safety considerations, sidewalks 10 feet in width are ideal for shared sidewalks with golf carts. Per the City Engineer's recommendation, should the regulations be revised to allow for golf carts on sidewalks less than 10 feet but no less than 6 feet, it shall be allowed only upon discretion of the City Engineer.

Golf Cart permits: Currently, there are eight issued permits. Permits are valid for two years and must be renewed prior to expiration. Staff will work with Marketing to prepare online and printed informational materials regarding the new Golf Cart Map/Routes and Paths and the Program requirements.

Map Update: The existing map that was included with the Program was primarily covering use in the Cove and Old Town areas. Over the years, the City has installed numerous other bike lanes that could also be used for golf carts and initiated an update of the map to reflect recent construction.

The primary adjustment in this update was to include all streets citywide that are 25 mph as Class III (unstriped) golf cart routes and provide citywide connectivity for golf cart destinations via arterial routes on Class II striped bike/golf cart lanes where available. The revised map shows the legal paths that currently allow golf carts or

have wide enough bike lanes that can be converted to allow golf carts. Staff is currently in the process of verifying lane widths on other streets to determine if they can also be re-striped to allow golf cart use.

Staff seeks Council direction on the regulations provided above and to final the update to the proposed Golf Cart Map (Attachment 3). An Ordinance amendment reflecting revisions to the Program regulations and the Final Golf Cart Map will be brought back for Council approval.

ORDINANCE NO. 474

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF LA QUINTA, CALIFORNIA, ADDING CHAPTER 12.69 TO TITLE 12 OF THE LA QUINTA MUNICIPAL CODE, PERTAINING TO REGULATIONS FOR GOLF CARTS ON CERTAIN STREETS

WHEREAS, the California Vehicle Code prohibits the use of golf carts on public streets except as permitted in California Vehicle Code 21115, 21115.1 and 21716; and

WHEREAS, the City established a Golf Cart Transportation Plan as part of its General Plan Update process, adopted on March 20, 2002; and

WHEREAS, in order to operate a golf cart on public streets in the City, the City Council finds that specific standards and requirements are necessary to preserve the public health and safety.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the City Council of the City of La Quinta does ordain as follows:

<u>SECTION 1.</u> Title 12 of the La Quinta Municipal Code is hereby amended to add Chapter 12.69, to read as follows:

12.69.010 Purpose and Intent. The California Streets and Highways Code, Sections 1950 through 1961, authorize local jurisdictions to establish golf cart transportation plans within their boundaries, under certain conditions and with certain requirements. The City has established the Golf Cart Transportation Plan in its General Plan and intends, by the addition of this Chapter of the Municipal Code, to establish standards, requirements and procedures for the implementation of the Golf Cart Transportation Plan.

12.69.020 Definitions. As used in this Chapter, the following words and phrases shall have the following meaning:

"City" means the City of La Quinta.

"Golf Cart" means a four-wheeled electric motor vehicle with an unladen weight of less than one thousand three hundred pounds (1,300), which is designed to be, and is operated at not more than 25 miles per hour, and is designed to carry golf equipment and no more than two persons, including the driver.

"Golf Cart Paths" or "Golf Cart Routes" means all City-owned travel ways that allow golf cart travel, including roadways.

There shall be three categories of golf cart paths:

- 1. Class I golf cart paths provide an area separate from the roadway used by automobile traffic for shared one-way or two-way golf carts, bicycles, pedestrians, and equestrians.
- 2. Class II golf cart paths provide a striped eight-foot lane for one-way golf cart and bicycle travel on a street or highway.
- 3. Class III golf cart paths provide for shared use with automobile and bicycle traffic. Class III paths are established by placing Golf Cart Route signs along roadways with speed limits of 25 miles per hour or less in order to link them to Class I or Class II paths.

"Golf Cart Route" means the map depicting routes and crossings that will be constructed, posted and designated for use by permitted golf carts.

12.69.030 Minimum Design Criteria for Golf Carts. All golf carts traveling on any golf cart path in the City must meet the following minimum design criteria:

- 1. The golf cart must be electrically powered.
- 2. The golf cart must be equipped and safely operated with all of the following equipment:
 - a. Red reflectors:
 - b. Parking brake;
 - c. Horn;
 - d. Headlights, brake lights and rear lights;
 - e. Front and rear turn signal indicator lights;
 - f. Windshield;
 - g. Seat belts;
 - h. Covered passenger compartment;
 - Mirror combination (left and right side mirrors, left and rear mirrors, or multi-directional cross bar mirror) and unobstructed view to the rear from the driver's seat.

12.69.040 Minimum Safety Criteria for Operation of Golf Cart. All golf cart operators operating golf carts on any golf cart path in the City must conform to the following operator requirements and safety criteria:

- Golf cart operators must be licensed drivers in the State of California with valid California Driver's license, or have a valid driver's license issued by a jurisdiction in accordance with Vehicles Code Sections 12502-12505.
- 2. Golf cart operators must comply with the financial responsibility requirements (insurance) established pursuant to Chapter 1 (commencing with Section 16000) of Division 7 of the California Vehicle Code.

- 3. No golf cart shall be operated on golf cart paths or Golf Cart Routes within the City without a current golf cart permit decal visibly displayed on the right rear fender of the golf cart.
- 4. The golf cart permit shall be valid for two years from the date of issuance.
- 5. Golf cart operators must maintain the golf cart in a safe condition and be properly loaded to conform with CVC Section 24002.
- 6. Golf cart operators may only travel in those golf carts that meet the minimum design criteria required by Section 12.69.030.
- Golf carts are limited to daytime operation and are permitted on public streets only during the time period between one hour prior to sunrise and one hour after sunset.
- 8. A maximum of two persons may ride in the golf cart and may only ride in the main passenger compartment equipped with safety belts. Both driver and passenger must wear safety belts at all times while the golf cart is being operated on Class I, II, or III golf cart paths.
- 9. Golf cart operators must yield the right-of-way to pedestrians, bicyclists, and equestrians.
- 10. Golf cart operators may only travel on designated golf cart routes or along streets with speed limits of 25 miles per hour or less.
- 11. Golf cart operators may not travel on or along streets with speed limits in excess of 25 miles per hour except on designated golf cart routes, and shall only cross at controlled intersections as designated on the golf cart route map.
- 12. Golf carts modified by removing any of the above safety equipment or a modification that in any way creates an unsafe cart will result in the immediate revocation of the golf cart permit and will be subject to any violations that apply under the California Vehicle Code. Should a golf cart be impounded pursuant to a violation under the State Vehicle Code, the registered owner shall be subject to any regulations imposed by the impounding authority pursuant to Section 22850.5 of the California Vehicle Code.
- 13. No person shall operate or move a golf cart upon a sidewalk except those persons who in the course of their employment by a state, federal, or local government, or school district maintenance crew.

12.69.050 Golf Cart Permit Process. The following golf cart permitting process is established:

- 1. No golf cart shall be operated on golf cart paths or Golf Cart Routes within the City without a current golf cart permit decal visibly displayed on the right rear fender of the golf cart.
- 2. Persons in the course of their employment by a state, federal, or local government, or school district shall be allowed to apply for a permit allowing operation of a golf cart on City sidewalks.
- 3. The golf cart permit shall be valid for two years from the date of issuance.

4. The golf cart permit may be revoked by the City Manager if he or she determines the golf cart which is the subject of the permit has been used by any person in a manner that violates one or more the provisions in this Chapter. If the permit is revoked, the owner of the golf cart may not reapply for a permit for the following 12 months.

12.69.060 Golf Cart Routes. The Public Works Director shall have the authority to add or delete Golf Cart Routes as the need arises or as conditions change in accordance with this Ordinance.

12.69.070 Enforcement of Golf Cart Plan. Any person operating a golf cart in the City in violation of this Chapter is guilty of an infraction punishable by a fine not exceeding one hundred dollars (\$100) or as permitted by the California Vehicle Code.

The City Council finds and determines that the City shall provide law enforcement for the Golf Cart Plan and enforce the rules and regulations of Chapter 12.69 of the City of La Quinta Municipal Code, the Streets and Highways Code (Division 2.5, Chapter 6, Sections 1950 through 1961) and Section 21716 of the California Vehicle Code. The passage of this Ordinance enables the City to enforce this program's provisions not found in the California Vehicle Code.

SECTION 2. SEVERABILITY. If any section, subsection, sentence, clause or phrase of this Ordinance is for any reason held to be invalid or unconstitutional by the decision of a court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of the Ordinance. The City Council of the City of La Quinta hereby declares that it would have passed this Ordinance, and each section, subsection, clause, sentence or phrase thereof, irrespective of the fact that any one or more other sections, subsections, clauses, sentences or phrases may be declared invalid or unconstitutional.

SECTION 3. EFFECTIVE DATE. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect thirty (30) days after its adoption.

SECTION 4. POSTING. The City Clerk shall cause this Ordinance to be posted in at least three public places designated by resolution of the City Council, shall certify to the adoption and posting of this Ordinance, and shall cause this Ordinance and its certification, together with proof of posting to be entered into the Book of Ordinances of the City of La Quinta.

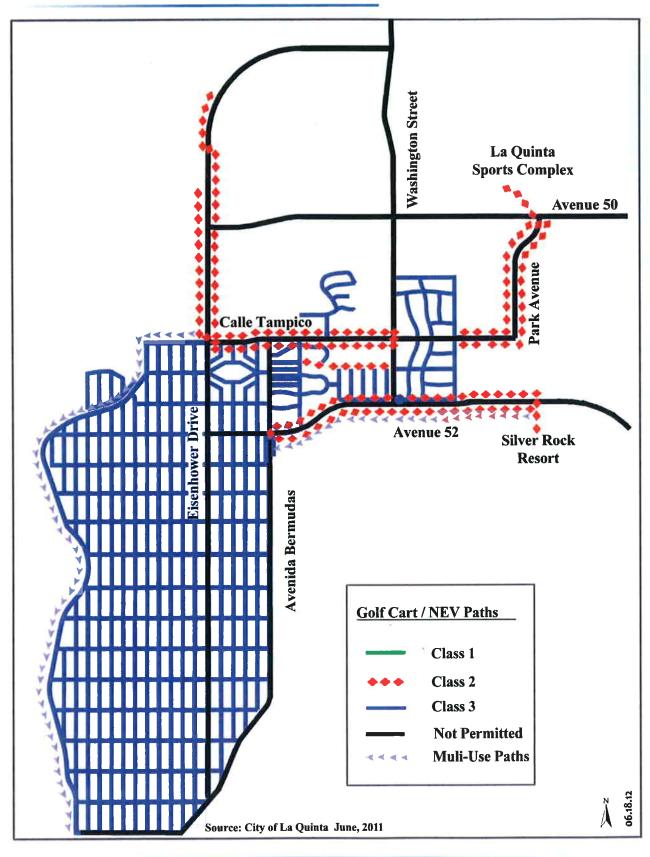

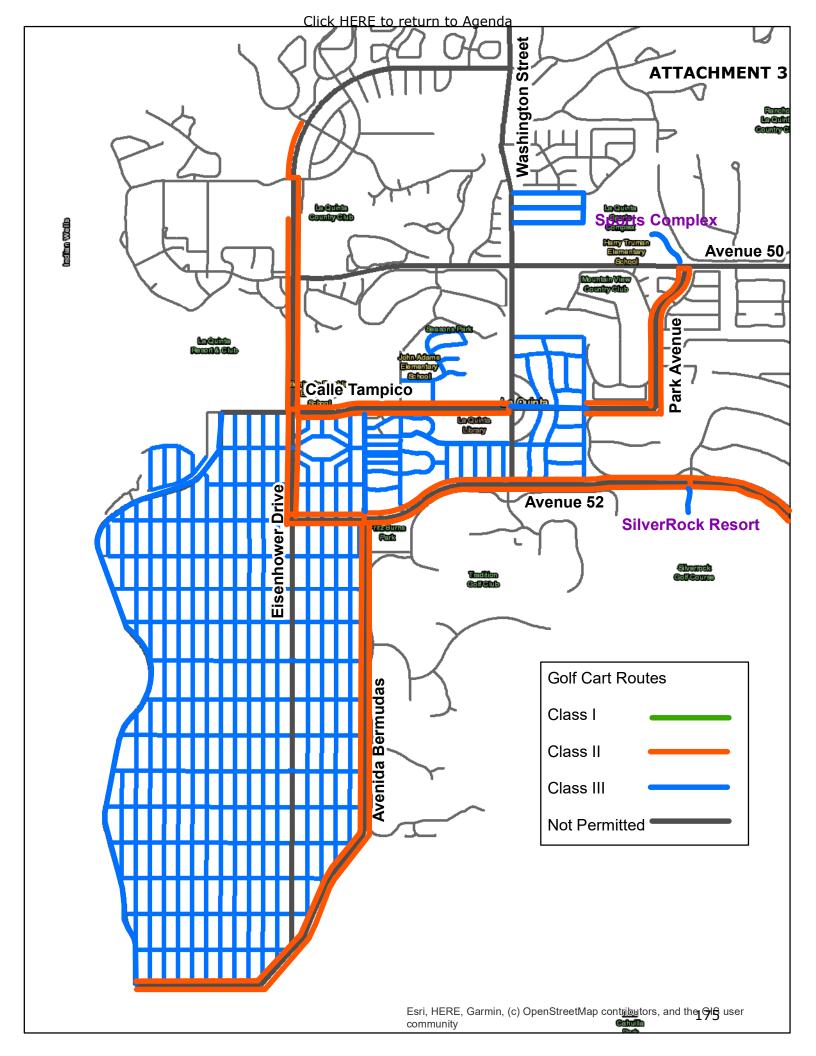




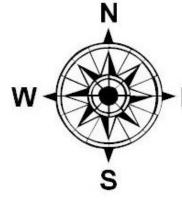
City of La Quinta General Plan Golf Cart /NEV/Multi-Use Paths (B) La Quinta, California

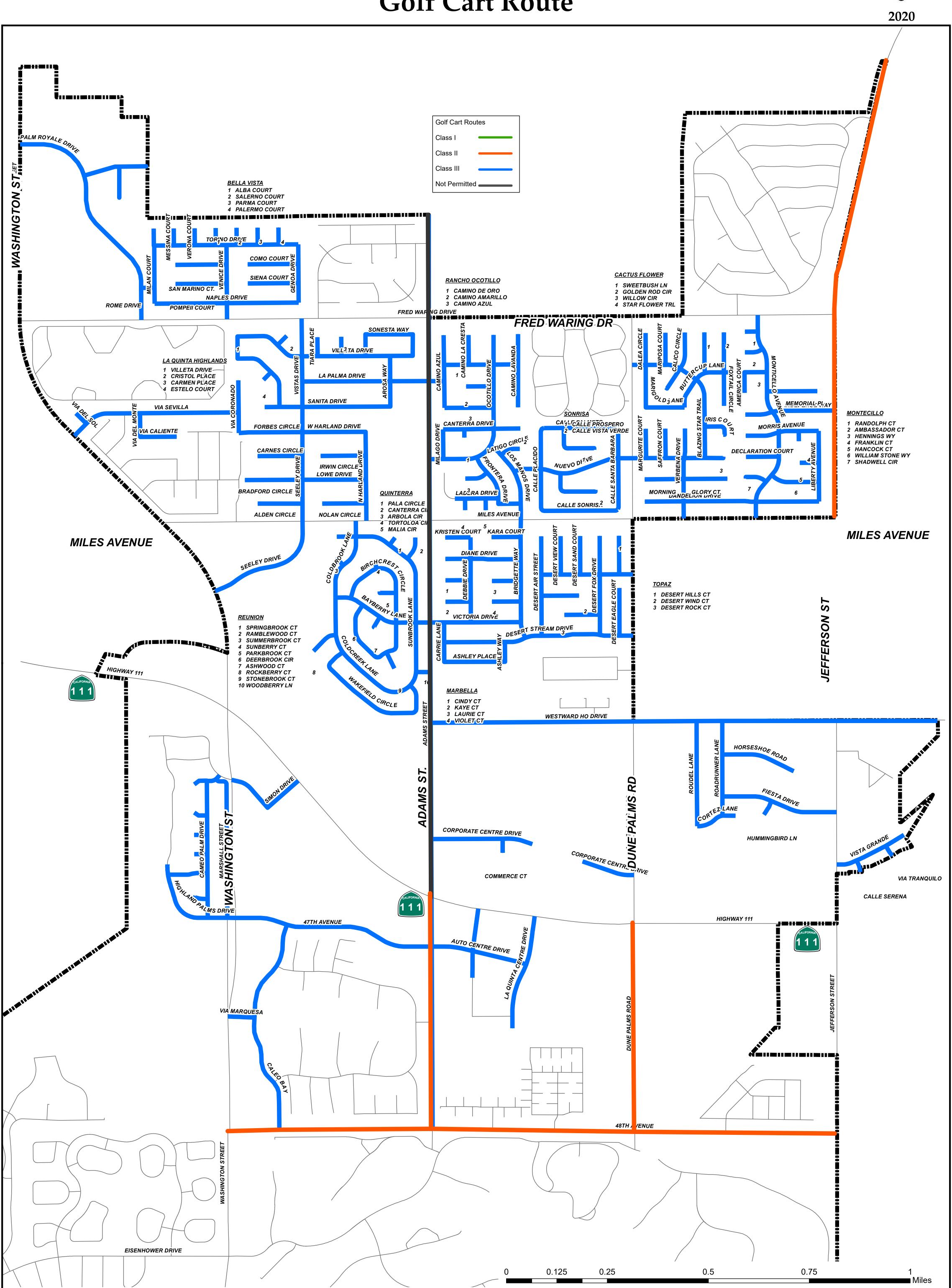

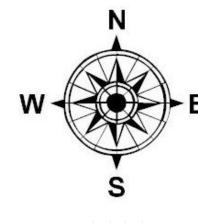
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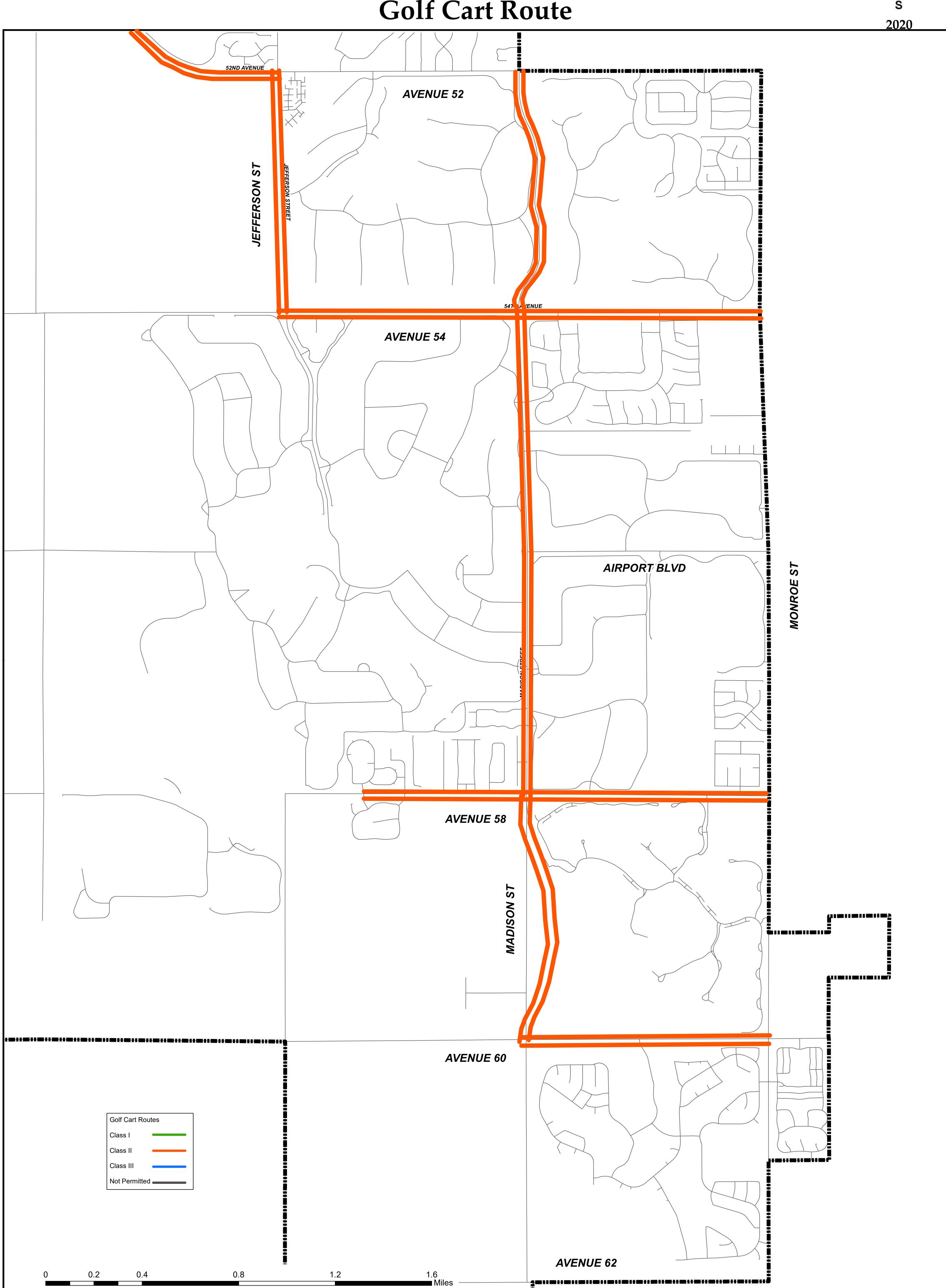




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California — CALIFORNIA — Golf Cart Route

AGENDA TITLE: CONTINUED FROM JULY 7, 2020: CONSIDER REQUEST FOR CONTINUANCE OF THE PUBLIC HEARING FOR A PROPOSED APPROXIMATE 125,000 SQUARE-FOOT SHOPPING CENTER WITH DRIVE-THROUGHS AND A 63,000 SQUARE-FOOT SUPERMARKET WITH ASSOCIATED VEHICLE FUEL CENTER; CEQA: THE DESIGN AND DEVELOPMENT DEPARTMENT HAS PREPARED A MITIGATED NEGATIVE DECLARATION UNDER THE CALIFORNIA ENVIRONMENTAL QUALITY ACT; LOCATION: NORTHWEST CORNER OF AVENUE 50 AND JEFFERSON STREET; PROJECT: PAVILION PALMS SHOPPING CENTER

RECOMMENDATION

- A. Consider the applicant's request for continuance of the public hearing for Environmental Assessment 2017-0006, Specific Plan 2017-0002, Amendment No. 2 of the Fairway Plaza Specific Plan (SP 1998-034), Tentative Parcel Map 2017-0003 (TPM 37370), and Site Development Permit 2017-0009, to give the applicant more time to prepare revised application package for staff and Council review.
- B. Remand image corridor height deviation request, stemming from revised building design, to Planning Commission for review at its regular meeting on November 24, 2020 and return with the complete application package to Council on December 15, 2020.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- The applicant is requesting a Specific Plan Amendment (SPA), TPM, Site Development Permit (SDP), and Environmental Assessment (EA) to construct an approximate 125,000 sq. ft. shopping center consisting of commercial/office and retail buildings.
- Council has heard this item during public hearings on February 4, March 3, May 5, and July 7, 2020, where Council granted a continuance to October 6 to give the applicant time to meet with City staff to further refine their design.
- The applicant submitted a request to continue the public hearing to December 15, 2020, to prepare revised application package for Council's review and consideration (Attachment 1).

BACKGROUND/ANALYSIS

Council held public hearings on February 4, March 3, May 5, and July 7, 2020 (staff reports and related materials are hereby incorporated by this reference), reviewed the proposal, considered public testimony, and asked the applicant to further revise the design of the site as follows:

- Revise the site plan to provide better pedestrian circulation;
- Make the gathering spaces a more cohesive part of the plan;
- Incorporate improved shade features;
- Consider reducing the amount of parking for the center, in favor of more neighborhood design features;
- Move the fuel center further to the north along Jefferson Street to create a more iconic corner at Avenue 50 and Jefferson Street;
- Explore not having a left out at the eastern driveway on Avenue 50;
- Consider what incorporating mixed uses could do for the center;
- Show more detail of the corner plaza;
- Revise corner building footprints to have better usable indoor space; and
- Show renderings of plaza from outside the center.

Following the July 7 meeting, staff drafted a schedule including meetings every two weeks and deadlines for submittals to facilitate the applicant's path to the October 6 hearing. Staff met with the applicant and reviewed the Council's comments with the applicant's design revisions. The applicant was unable to provide full plans for staff review prior to the hearing deadlines but has provided exhibits showing the plaza area enhanced with shade structures, area for future artwork, and bollards near the parking (Attachment 2). The architecture of the buildings has been enhanced with recessed areas and wider awnings to provide patio seating for outdoor dining. At the street side corner, the buildings include wings that converge toward each other, creating a walking corridor in between, which also includes recessed areas with awnings for patios. The building wings reach a height of 38 feet at their highest point.

In order to accommodate this height, the SPA would need to incorporate a zoning deviation from the current image corridor height limit. Building height along image corridors (Avenue 50 and Jefferson Street) is limited to 22 feet within 150 feet of the roadway. If Council desires this building style, the SPA can be modified to include the following language:

"To accommodate variation in building design, the maximum building height shall be 40 feet, per the underlying CC zone, including within the first 150 feet of the Avenue 50 and Jefferson Street rights-of-way."

Since this request was not included in the SPA that the Planning Commission (PC) reviewed in December 2019 and provided recommendation on, staff recommends this aspect of the project be remanded to PC for their recommendation. PC would only need to review the zoning deviation from the image corridor height requirement and any potential impacts the deviation might have.

PUBLIC NOTICE

The public hearing notice was advertised in *The Desert Sun* newspaper on June 26, 2020 and was sent to property owners and occupants within a 500-foot radius of the project site, in accordance with Section 9.200.100 of the Municipal Code. Since the July 7, 2020 hearing was continued to a specified date, it was not necessary to issue another notice.

ALTERNATIVES

Continue to a date certain the City Council's Public Hearing for further consideration of height deviation request, stemming from revised building design.

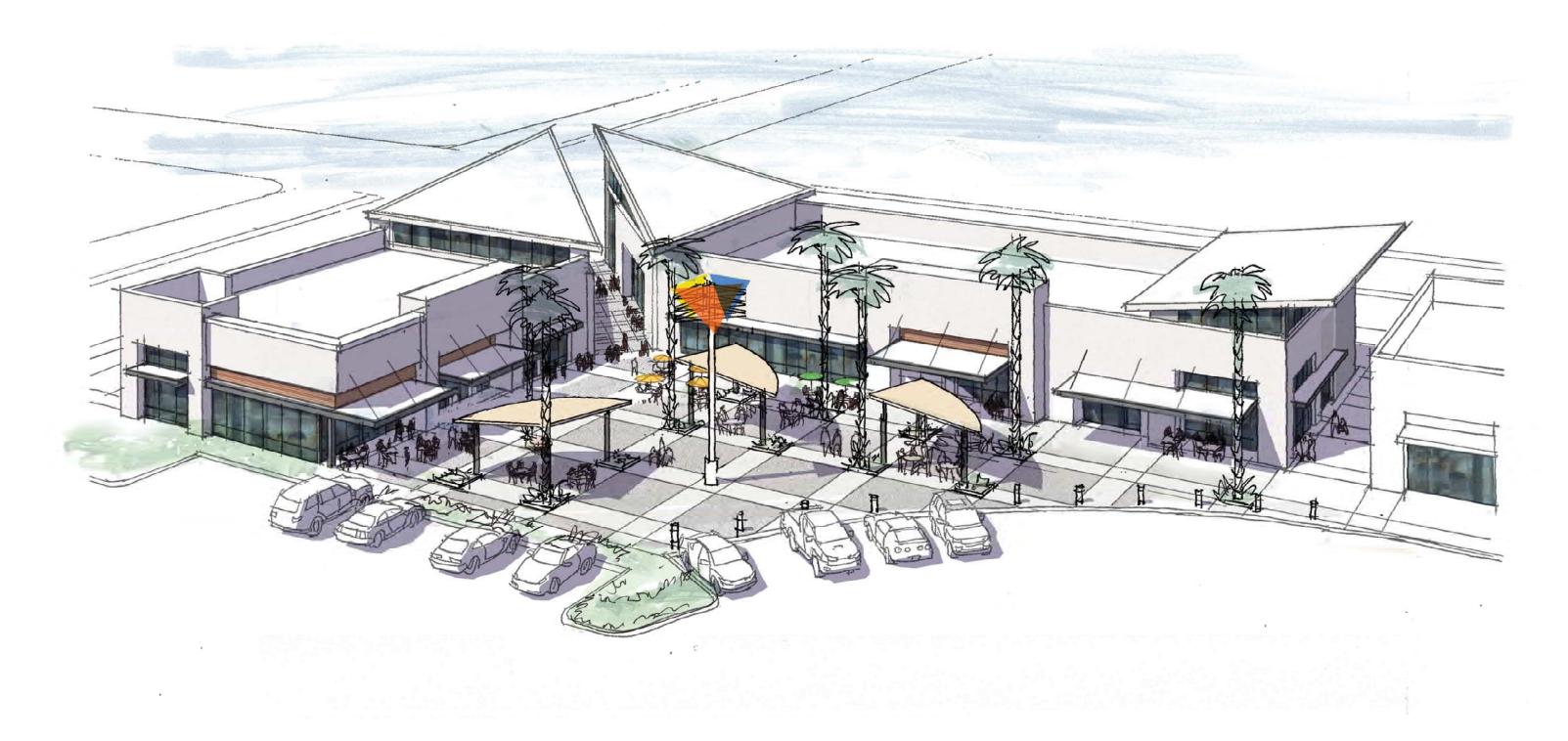

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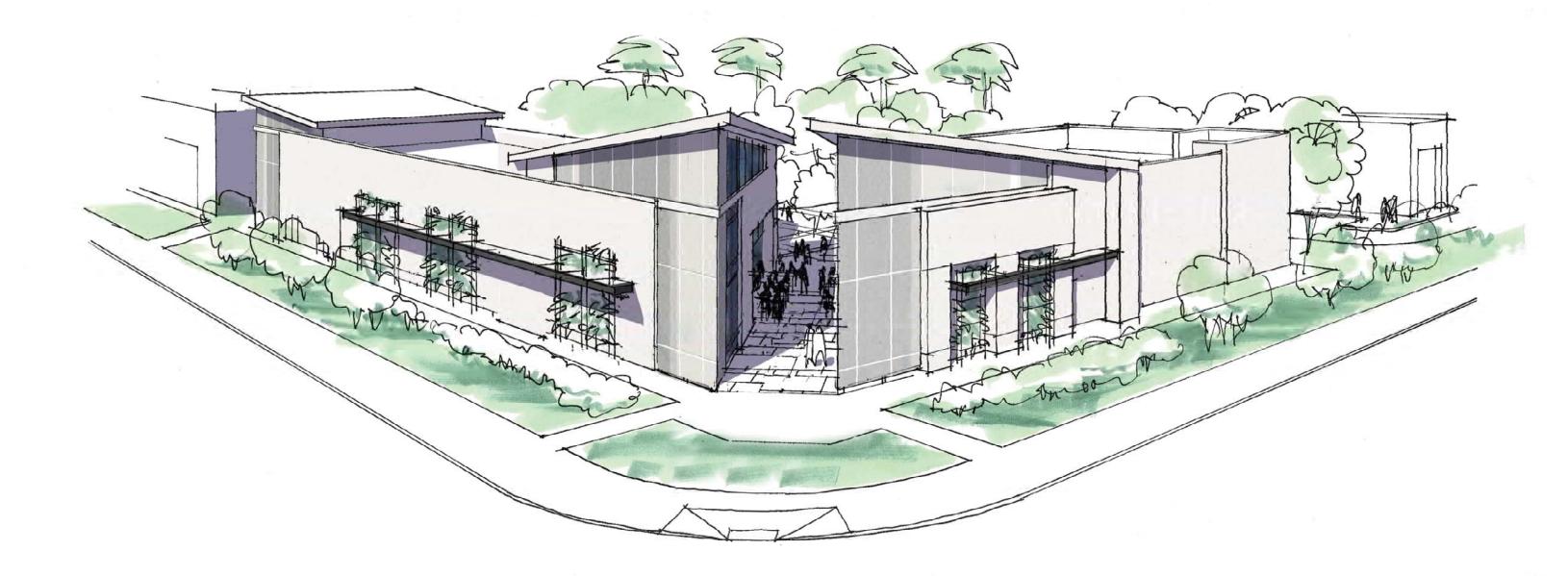

Management Specialist Kinley said in July 2020 the Housing Authority is scheduled to consider participating in and providing funding for an affordable housing assistance program, managed by Habitat for Humanity, which offers assistance with affordable home maintenance and repairs; noted the Housing successor report and Housing annual report have been filed; and at the April 21, 2020 regular quarterly meeting, the Housing Authority approved Funding Option No. 1 providing \$83,333.33 assistance to area homeless service providers and homeless prevention partners for Coachella Valley Rescue Mission, Martha's Village and Kitchen, and Coachella Valley Association of Governments.
